**SEVERE REACTION** IN GRAIN PRICES

Extreme Weakness of Coarse Grains Has Pronounced Effect on Wheat Futures.

Chicago, March 30.—Grain underwent a severe setback in price today, largely as a result of liquidation on the part of rural holders of corn. Wheat closed heavy, 3c to 5½c net lower, with May 11.32 to 11.40 and July \$1.21 to \$1.21½. Corn lost 2½c to 2½c to 2½c and oats ½c to 1½c to 1½c. Provisions gained 5c to 50c.

Likelihood that no harm to the growing wheat crop had been done by recent unseasonable weather made the wheat market open to the influence of unusual depression in the corn trade. Some reports indeed were to the effect that lower temperatures had been a benefit instead of a detriment to wheat because too rapid growth had been given a needed check. Bearish sentiment was also emphasized owing to the nearly complete absence of new export business. The lack of confidence on the buying side became especially apparent in the last hour, when the corn market was under heavy selling pressure. It could scarcely be said that wheat offerings were of larger volume, but no support developed and values crumbled away.
