NATIONALIST MAYOR CHOSEN FOR DERRY

Audience Cheered, Waved Flags and Cried "Derry Has Surrendered."

Belfast, Jan. 30.—An unparalleled scene for this city followed the election today by a vote of 20 to 19 of Alderman O'Dowery as Derry's first Nationalist mayor. The audience cheered and waved flags and handkerchiefs and shouted up to the opposition, "Derry has surrendered, we will make you chew wood."

While the mayor was being installed in office, the crowd sang "God Save Ireland." Mayor O'Dowery in his address declared that flags, if they were of an insulting character, would not be permitted to fly from the Derry Guildhall in future. He added that a long and painful chapter in the history of the country had been closed. A Sinn Feiner was elected mayor of Sligo. He said no British delegation would be received by him during his year of office.
