TORONTO CUP TO CLELL TURNEY

Main Chance Second and Martin Doyle Third in Feature At Woodbine.

Toronto, Woodbine Track, May 30.—Despite the threatening weather, another big crowd turned out to the Woodbine today. Although the track was not fast, some good time was made, and there were several close finishes.

ENGLAND WINS BALOON RACE

London, May 30.—The greatest bal-loon race in the history of British aeronautics was started this after-noon from Hurlingham. It is held in connection with the International Aeronautic Federation that has just had its fourth annual conference here. The winning point is about thirty miles distant, being the old Country Inn at Burchell's Green, three miles west of Maidenhead. Thirty-one balloons, decked with flags of their respective countries and car-rying upwards of one hundred pas-sengers, were successfully sent to the east. Several of the cars carry women passengers. The nations rep-resented are France, Germany, Great Britain, Belgium and Switzerland. The English balloon Valkyrie, C. F. Follock, pilot, was the first to land coming down about one mile from the winning post.

WIGGINS WINS FIVE-HOUR RACE

Goderich, May 30.—James Wiggins, a brother of Champion Dan Wiggins, of this place, tonight won a five-hour endurance roller skating race over six competitors, of whom two finished. J. Swartz took second money and O. Todd, third. Wiggins traveled 73 1/2 miles in the five hours. Swartz went 73, and Todd 73 miles.

FAST ENGLISH TRIAL FOR THE OLYMPIC

London, May 30.—In the prelimina-ries for the Olympic games held at the Stadium this afternoon, the 1,500 meter (1,639.5 yards) run was won by H. A. Wilson, of the Hellanshire harriers, in 3 minutes 59 4-5 seconds. He beat the time made by James B. Lightbody, of Chicago, for the same distance at the Olympic games held in Athens in 1906 by 5 3-5 seconds.
