Great Britain to Have Two Dreadnoughts to Germany's One by 1912

With Cruisers To Be Paid for by Australia and New Zealand, Government Will Have Added \$25,000,000 to Value of Fighting Force Since Last March.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 .- The Herald's

Zealand are not to be delayed, but will be given out almost immediately, and these two vessels are to be completed by March 31, 1912. The result of this will be that this country will have 22 dreadnoughts complete when Germany will have 11 only, since it is now as nearly as certain as possible that the two ships Ersatz-Heimdall and Ersatz-Hildebrand, the first turbine-driven battleships for Germany, cannot be Hidebrand, the first turbine-driven battleships for Germany, cannot be completed before the summer of that year. Thus Great Britain practically is completing her dreadnoughts to what is called the two-keels-to-one standard.


