#### RUSSIANS REALIGNING

Decisive Conflict is Yet to Come, According to Petrograd

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Feb. 13.—The retirement of the Russian forces in East Prussia and the great British air raid on the coast of Belgium appear today as the biggest factors in the military situation. On the other hand, the diplomatic field would seem to be dominated by the American notes to Great Britain and Germany, especially to Germany, where the newspapers and the public, according to news despatches reaching here from Berlin, are insisting in spite of Washington's protest and in spite of the consequences, that the German submarine policy must be pursued relentlessly.

No Other Course. The gist of German opinion, as it has been thus far transmitted to London, would appear to be that neutral powers have been sufficiently warned to keep out of the military arena, and inasmuch as Germany is facing starvation at the hands of Great Britain there is no other course for her to pursue.

Fighting in the Snow. The battling in the Carpathians is going on in the snow, but the information from this field of activities is most scant and the indications reaching London are that it is still a serious affair, with both sides sustaining enormous losses. Further, that they are continuing to advance into Bukovina.

Prizes Offered. Several British shipowners are offering prizes of £1000 (\$6000) to any merchant ship which rams and sinks a German submarine.

#### PARIS CANNOT SECURE PROPER FUEL SUPPLY

Plenty of English Coal is Received, But Men to Break it Are Scarce

Canadian Press Despatch. PARIS, Feb. 13.—Paris is still feeling the lack of fuel. There is said to be plenty of English coal, but it comes in great blocks and there is not enough men to break it up at Rouen, the coal port of Paris, so as to make it available for the retail trade. To remedy the situation the minister of commerce proposes to recruit miners to increase the output of French mines that are not in the hands of the Germans.

The ambassador reiterated, it was learned, that the attempt which he declared Great Britain made was to starve the civil population of his country by preventing the foodstuffs from entering Germany.

#### French and German Aircraft Are Showing Great Activity

#### Machines Are Flying at Great Height and Generally Avoid Projectiles—Fight in Air Over Muhlhausen.

PARIS, Feb. 13.—5.35 p.m.—Great activity of French and German aircraft is reported from the Sundgau region of Upper Alsace, according to a despatch from Basel, Switzerland, to The Paris Temps. The machines are flying at great height, and generally avoid projectiles.

#### RAILROAD STRIKE IS AVERTED IN BRITAIN

Managers and Union Men Reach Agreement, and Will Announce Terms on Monday

Announcement was made following a conference between railroad managers and representatives of the union that an agreement has been reached, the terms of which will be announced next Monday.

#### BAR SALES TAX MAY BE RAISED BY MR. HANNA

#### Proposal Now Before Cabinet to Increase Tax on Licensees

#### CITY BARS AFFECTED

Mr. Hanna's Action Will Depend on Extent of Drinking

The Ontario Government may not be prepared to institute very drastic temperance legislation at the session which opens on Tuesday, but it is conceded that some real advance will be made. Out of several proposals which are no doubt in cabinet consideration it is understood that one which would increase the tax on bar receipts obtains general favor, and may be introduced in a bill by Hon. W. J. Hanna.

As the law now stands all city licensees whose bars return more than \$50 per day are expected to pay 5 per cent. of the surplus to the government. A slightly lower rate prevails in the country. The extent of the revenue that is required is estimated by the license department.

#### TWO BRITISH AIRMEN KILLED

Attempt to Bombard German Camp at Brussels Ended in Death

#### FIERCE FIGHT IN AIR

#### Enemy's Aeroplane Succeeded in Causing British Machine to Fall

BERLIN, Feb. 13, via London.—Repeated attempts have been made of late, by British and French airmen, to reach Brussels. On Thursday of this week, an English aeroplane approached the Belgian capital presumably to bombard the German camp there. A German aeroplane ascended and a fierce fight ensued, ending in victory for the German. The British machine suddenly crashed to the ground and its two occupants were picked up dead.
