SUCCESS OF JAPS

IN SHIPPING

The Japanese snatch away one portion of the shipping trade after the other. They have even succeeded in crowding out the most noted English steamship line, the Peninsular & Oriental Company, from east Asiatic traffic. For fifty years did this English line successfully carry on trade in the East, but now it frankly admits that it is being steadily driven out of Japanese shipping. Today officers and crew of the two greatest Japanese marine companies are almost exclusively Japanese or Chinese. The pay of the yellow sailors is notoriously very much lower than that of the whites, while their board, too, is far less expensive. In addition to this, shipbuilding is much cheaper in Japan than in America.

Japanese shipping in the Pacific is steadily undermining not only American but European shipping also. The tonnage of their merchant marine rose from 477,430 tons in 1898 to 1,115,880 tons in 1907.

No subsidy granted by the United States would enable our shipping to compete with that of Japan in the Pacific trade. It is true that Japan gives government aid to its shipping in this trade, but it was in the way of a start, where the companies were weak financially--New Orleans Picayune.

BACK UP DRY DOCK FOR ST. JOHN

Fredericton Board of Trade Resolution--Chas. H. Eaton Dead

Fredericton, Oct. 20--At a meeting of the council of the board of trade this evening a telegram was forwarded to the minister of public works asking him to ascertain and inform the board as to the effect of the prevailing rumor that the military school which was established here in 1884 is to be removed from the city, and intimating that if the facts warranted it a delegation would be sent to Ottawa to advocate the rights of Fredericton in this behalf.

The action of the Halifax board of trade in reference to the proposed dry dock at St. John was also discussed and the following resolution adopted:

"Resolved, that the Fredericton board of trade regrets the position assumed by the Halifax board of trade to offset the efforts now being put forth to develop the transportation facilities and commercial interests of eastern Canada by the establishment of dry docks and other works at the port of St. John."

F. B. Edgcombe received a telephone message this evening informing him of the death at Princeton (N.J.) at 6 o'clock, of his father-in-law, Charles Henry Eaton, for years a prominent figure in business circles on the St. Croix. He had been suffering from bronchial and heart trouble for some time. He was a son of the late Joseph Emerson Eaton, and was born at Milltown, Charlotte county, seventy-seven years ago, and resided there the greater part of his life. When a young man he engaged in lumbering and milling business and carried it on successfully for many years. He resided at Lexington (Mass.) for two years, but since 1898 he has made his home at Forest Station (N.J.), where he owned a large stock farm. When death claimed him he was visiting his son at Princeton.

Deceased was a man of the highest integrity and was esteemed by all who enjoyed his acquaintance. He had many friends in this city and throughout the province, who will regret to learn of his death.

The late Mr. Eaton leaves one daughter, Mrs. F. B. Edgcombe, of this city, and three sons, Charles F., of Princeton; Alton H., of Calais, and Fred C., of Barry, Vermont; also three brothers, Joseph and Herbert, of Calais; and Bradley, of New York. Mrs. Benton, of New York, and Miss May Eaton, of Boston, are half sisters. Mr. and Mrs. Edgcombe will go to Princeton to attend the funeral.

McGILL STARTS A HARBOR COURSE

Montreal, Oct. 29--(Special)--A new course allied to Canada's advanced position in shipping and naval affairs has just been inaugurated at McGill University. It is a harbor engineering, which will include lectures on docks, dry docks, ports, port approaches, and all kindred matters. The lectures will be given by F. W. Cowie, chief harbor engineer for Montreal.

CANADIANS IN POWER PROJECT

City of Mexico, Mex., Oct. 29--The syndicate of Montreal and Toronto men which has already invested many millions of dollars in electrical and railway enterprises in Mexico, particularly in the vicinity of this city, has recently extended its operations to Northern Mexico, where it has just let the contract for the construction of a great dam across the Conchos River in the State of Chihuahua for the purpose of forming a reservoir of water to afford the initial power for its proposed hydro-electric plant to be installed there. A separate company has been organized to carry out the plans for this new project.

It is called the Compania Agricola de Fuerza Electrica. The contract for building the dam was awarded to S. Pearson and Son Ltd. Its cost will be about \$7,500,000 gold. Embraced in this contract is the building of a system of irrigation canals and ditches which will be operated in connection with the electrical enterprises. The dam will be the second largest dam on the American continent, it is said. It will form a reservoir which will have a capacity of 1,840,000,000 cubic metres of water.

The proposed hydro-electric plant will have a capacity for generating 25,000 horse power. It will be transmitted to the towns and mining camps within a radius of two hundred miles of the plant. The dam will be more than two hundred feet high.

The company has also let the contract for a road about twenty miles long, from the site of the proposed reservoir to a connection with the Mexican Central Railroad and Santa Rosalia.
