Cherry, Il., Nov. 24—Practically all the means of escape having been blocked 1: bodies of those who perished in the Cherdebris falling and covering the top of the staircase. ry Mine disaster were found this morning on a staircase at the mouth of the third or lower level. One hundred and sixty-eight bodies were found, leaving about a score to be accounted for.

The bodies were in a great tangled mass completely blocking the staircase leading from the third to the second vein, and were scattered along the vein where they dropped before reaching the stairway.

Black damp was the cause of death, all about the fan.

The document states specifically that he shall have no more than is provided for in their marriage contract.

The marquise and her sister caused great supprise a few years ago by renouncing the Roman Catholic faith, to which they had previously devoted themselves and large portions of their inheritance. The Caldwell estate is one of the oldest in Louisville.

The marquise left \$100,000 to a nephew and \$10 000 each to two distant cousins.
