Some have talked in a way that shows how deficient they are in knowledge of the true qualifications of a good farmer. If a man fails in other pursuits it is suggested that he had better take to farming. Such a man might possibly succeed, but there is hardly a chance of his so doing, simply because a successful agriculturist requires first, a real taste and preference for it. He must have sound judgment as respects times and places and methods of working. He must have and exercise discrimination about soils and seeds and their relations. Then it demands a good deal of skill and experience in all matters relating to cattle, horses and sheep. In short a farmer should have a first-class intellect.
