BLUSHING.

(Weekly Scotsman.) Many of my weekly correspondents—especially those still in their teens—seem to suffer daily agonies through their habit of blushing. Some of them, indeed, feel so acutely self-conscious about it that they avoid all company, and just at the age when young people desire and need companionship and active personal interest, these poor young things turn themselves into hermits, see no one, and avoid all social life. Their difficulty lies, of course, in the unfortunate fact that the mere fear of blushing makes one blush.

Blushing is, scientifically, due to the dilatation of the superficial or capillary blood vessels—those which lie in the surface skin—this dilatation being caused by the temporary paralysis or, at any rate, imperfect action of the vaso-motor nerve centre, which governs the action of the blood vessels. The nervous system is intricately linked together, and any disturbance in one part is bound to be seriously disturbed without affecting one or more of the others. Hence the mere disturbance caused by the acute shyness and the fear of blushing affects the vaso-motor centre and brings about the dreaded result.

The cure of blushing, apart from that almost always wrought by time, lies only in the exercise of the will. The sufferer should first clearly understand that the blush itself is neither ridiculous nor unbecoming. Next he should try to realize that even if he blushes, hardly anyone will notice the fact; that most people are far more worried about their own blushing than they are about the blushing of others. And last he should try to strengthen his will-power by forcing himself to go into all kinds of company and "brave it out." Once he can bring himself to this, his cure is not far distant.
