## WOULD FOOD INSPECTOR IMPROVE SITUATION?

A Plea for a Proper Classification  
of Butter, Eggs and Other Pro-  
ducts

To the Editor of the Times—

Sir:—In all the agitation against the  
increased prices of food in St. John not  
one word seems to have been uttered  
in favor of the regulation or classifica-  
tion of butter, eggs and other perish-  
ables. To my mind this is of paramount  
importance and if brought about would  
do more towards relieving the stress than  
anything else. To explain what I mean  
by "regulation" classification, I will  
set up a supposition case.

Good dairy butter is selling at 45c.  
per pound, or possibly 50c. for the very  
choicest. This butter is probably made  
scientifically in a perfectly hygienic and  
scrupulously clean dairy. In very truth,  
tastiness and richness it is of a grade,  
none but a food crank would demand better.  
The price is high, but some people in  
consideration of the quality of the but-  
ter will be willing to pay it.

But—and here's the point—you go to  
your corner grocery, your front street  
dealer or more particularly to the Coun-  
try Market and what do you find?  
Everybody has the 45c. or 46c. or 50c.  
price, while the butter offered ranges  
in quality from old fashioned axle grease  
to that of passing fair quality. Some stall  
dealers in the market sell the best  
grades for their high-class trade, but on  
the whole the "open market" butter is  
indifferent in quality.

## TRIBUTE TO BRAVE HALIFAX BOY AT THE BATTLE FRONT

Lieut. Eric R. Dennis, Son of  
Senator Dennis, Who Won  
Military Cross

(From the Ottawa Free Press.)  
"Lieutenant Eric Reginald Dennis, gas-  
tated as having gained the Military Cross,  
is the son of Senator Dennis, of the  
Halifax Herald, and one of the leading  
newspaper men of Canada.  
"The young lieutenant's progress from  
the peaceful militia of Canada before the  
war to the battle line and honors gained  
in the company of veterans, is a very  
pretty sample of Canadian behavior in  
the game of life and death.  
Was Only Nineteen Years.  
"When was opened this young man  
was a lieutenant in the 68th Halifax  
Rifles, aged eighteen, and eager for ser-  
vice. He and his companions were the  
first men in Nova Scotia to offer their  
services. He was told to stay with his  
militia regiment and help garrison the  
forts at Halifax. Home service did not

suit Lieutenant Dennis and he sought to  
resign his lieutenantcy that he might en-  
list as a private for overseas. He was  
not permitted to resign. Finally he  
was transferred to the 40th Nova  
Scotia overseas, under Colonel Vince, and  
crossed the Atlantic as a captain. In  
England he was made adjutant. As has  
happened to many regiments in England,  
the 40th was broken up; the men were  
sent to the front as reinforcements, the  
higher officers were left cooling their  
heels in England.  
Took Reduction.  
"The young man, determined to see  
service, decided not to let dignity stand  
in his way. He took reduction in rank  
from adjutant and captain to become  
junior lieutenant with the famous Sec-  
ond Battalion of the first division,  
which had been shot almost clean  
out of junior officers. This took him to  
the front, where the Second Battalion  
had already gained fighting fame.  
Became of Age.  
"Last summer Senator Dennis visited  
the front with a Canadian parliament-  
ary party, and in the trenches of the  
muddy, bloody Ypres salient celebrated  
the young soldier's advent to legal man-  
hood and his achievement of twenty-one  
years. A few weeks later the division  
was transferred to the Somme, and the  
Second Battalion, the day after it ar-  
rived, was called up to nip off a little  
"snout salient" which projected toward  
the front, where the Second Battalion  
was a preparation for the general show.  
Under Colonel Swift, the operation was  
most successful. In fifteen minutes, the  
regiment took 400 yards of desired  
trench, inflicted 600 casualties on the  
gunners, and gained for themselves  
twenty-eight medals and crosses, one of  
which was a Victoria Cross.  
Recommended for Honors  
Twice in One Week.  
"Lieutenant Dennis was recommended  
for a Military Medal on that day, but  
so much glory had been gained there  
were not enough medals for all recom-  
mended. It remained for him to gain his  
emblem of efficient bravery on a latter  
day. It was deferred only a week, but  
the details of that fight have not yet  
come through.  
"Most of the men and officers of the  
Second Battalion are from Eastern On-  
tario, many being from the Ottawa dis-  
trict.  
"Lieutenant Dennis and Lieutenant  
Pringle, who, single-handed, captured  
a machine gun and died across its  
muzzle, were the only eastern men in the  
battalion."
