

Council Deals With Matter of Repairs to Retaining Walls

Recommendations for repair work to retaining walls in Main street and Duke street and decision to proceed with other regular work on the Ashburn road bridge over the Marsh Creek, with half the cost borne by the Provincial Government, comprised most of the business before the Common Council this morning.

RETAINING WALLS.

Commissioner Frink presented a report on retaining wall work in Erin street, near the property of Mrs. M. Carson, in Main street, and also retaining wall work near the property of George Ballantyne, in Duke street, the former being estimated to cost \$800 and the latter \$215.

MATTER REMEDIED

The Commissioner also drew attention to the fact that in their expedition work in Lombard street the C. N. R. engineers, through a minor error, had not taken a small strip of land that would tend to shut them off from their own property.


