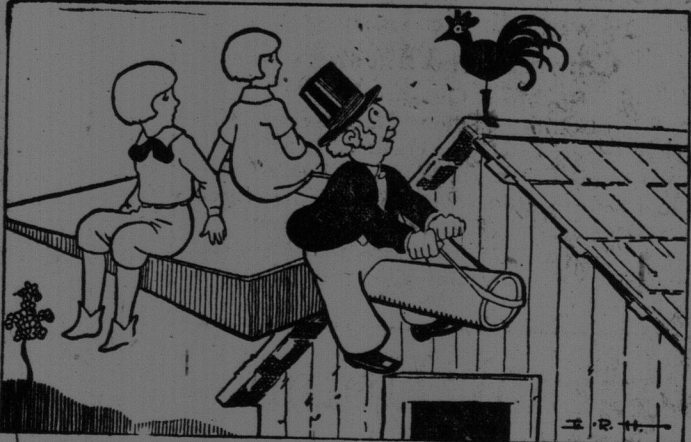

## Responsibility

Give your children a definite responsibility early in life! This is a practice with the Mann children of Anytown, each of whom was assigned to a task that had to be carried out either daily or weekly.

Since responsibilities are one day certain to overtake them, a gradual paving of the way makes the final break much easier.

Figure out some certain task, either around the house or in the neighborhood. Set a definite time for the carrying out of it and, if possible, try to keep it within a definite time. This establishes it as a routine.

Try to make the task something constructive and, also, let the child get in the habit of co-operating in a small way with the running of the establishment that he may come to identify himself with a share of the responsibility. Words made of standard steel channels in place of the ancient wooden props are being used in the mines of Germany.

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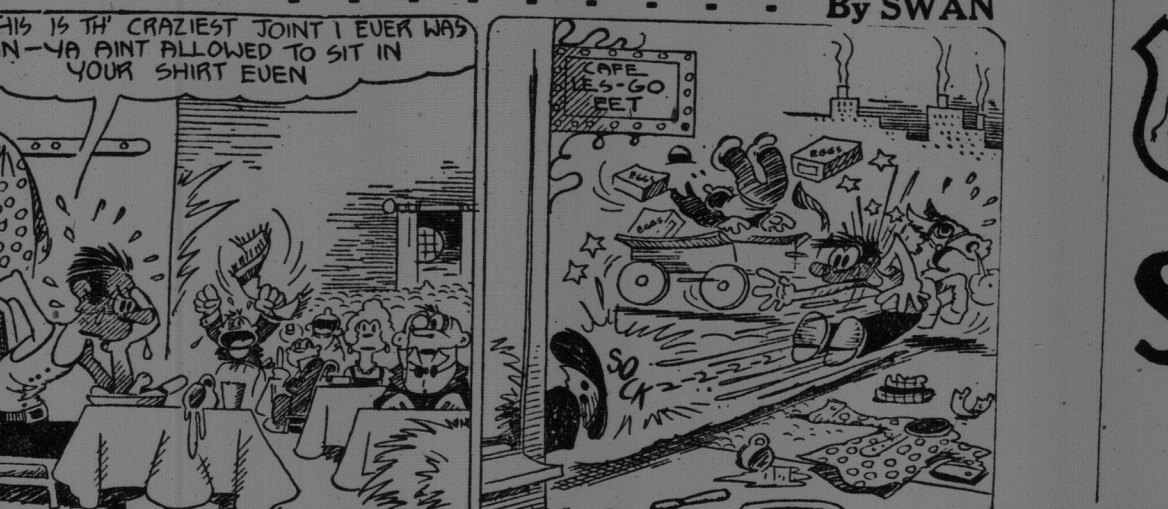
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
