## OUTLOOK IS POOR FOR NATURAL GAS

Report on Situation in Ontario Does Not Prove Encouraging.

In a report on the natural gas situation in the province of Ontario, handed in by Commissioner E. E. Estlin to the minister of mines, a gloomy summing up of possibilities and of the situation in this field is made.

The prefect of the report states that depletion has been considerably accelerated owing to heavy consumption in war-time, that gas enterprises hold out no hope of financial gain, and therefore do not attract capital for further development, which fact gives promise of the situation becoming more acute as time goes on.

"If a general readjustment in the whole situation does not take place immediately the business will pass into the decline, and this valuable fuel supply will be lost to about 15 per cent. of the population of the province," the report states. In addition the commercial end of the business is hedged in with contractual obligations assumed when the put to find sufficient to put on floors for exhibition purposes.

## QUEBEC'S NEW TIMBER TARIFF IS ANNOUNCED

Schedule for Cutting on Crown Lands Approved by Council.

Quebec, Aug. 31.-The Province of Quebec's new tariff for the cutting of timber on crown lands, which was recently approved by an order-in-council, has been made public here. It is as follows:-

1.-On all square lumber or flats: (a) White pine, oak, carya, white oak, fifteen cents per cubic foot; (b) Red pine, elm, ash, cedar, whitewood or linden, wild cherry, maple and tamarac, twelve cents per cubic foot; (c) Fir and North American fir, grey pine or cypress, spruce, birch, aspen and poplar, ten cents per cubic foot.

2.-Sawed logs or bark and large timbers: (a) White pine, oak, carya and walnut, \$5 per 1,000 feet; (b) Red pine, elm, ash, whitewood or linden, wild cherry, maple and tamarac, \$3.50 per 1,000 feet; (c) Fir, North American fir, grey pine or cypress, spruce, birch, aspen, poplar or cedar, \$2.70 per 1,000 feet.

3.-Poles of more than eighteen feet and not exceeding ten inches in diameter at the thin end: (a) Thirty feet or less in length, seventy-five cents each; (b) Thirty to forty feet, \$1.50 each; (c) Forty to fifty feet, \$3 each; (d) Fifty feet or more, \$5 each.

4.-Railway ties of not more than nine feet, fifteen cents each.

5.-Other articles of value, fifteen per cent. ad. valorem.

## STILL HIGHER PRICES IN THE HARDWARE LIST

(Hardware and Metal, Aug. 28.) More changes are made this week in an upward direction. Among the lines bearing a higher price are stove pipes and stovepipe elbows and there seems to be a decided shortage of material to make them and they are likely to be very scarce this fall. Higher prices are noted on chums and ashtrays. Difficult grades of lubricating oils have also been marked upward. Advances on roofing and building papers, on coal tar and pitch and creosote oil are reported. Horse shoe nails, fibre chair seats, some lines of English table cutlery and some makes of paint brushes are all so affected.

Business, although a little slack, is said to be good; full lines are having a ready sale.

No improvement is felt in the supply of iron and steel products in the heavy lines, and stocks of these commodities are very low everywhere. Steel wire goods are still scarce and the effect of improved transportation conditions, if any, has not been felt.

Stoves and ranges are reported to be very scarce and makers are being hard put to find sufficient to put on floors for exhibition purposes.

Collections are coming in well.
