HOME RULE

London, Sept. 15.—After the Unionists had made a formal protest, and had left the chamber, the House of Commons this afternoon passed through all its stages the bill introduced by Premier Asquith to suspend the operation of the Irish Home Rule and the Welsh Disestablishment Bills.

In the House of Lords the motion for a second reading of the home rule bill was adjourned, on a vote of 98 to 29.

Introducing his bill Premier Asquith strongly repudiated the assertion that the government had violated any of its assurances not to proceed with controversial legislation. To have postponed the passage of the bills until after the termination of the war, he said, would have had a deplorable effect on the Irish race all over the world, and on Irish recruiting. The premier promised that before the home rule bill came into operation the government would introduce an entirely new amending bill.

Andrew Bonar Law, the opposition leader, during whose speech the Liberals left the chamber, entered his protest against the bill introduced by Mr. Asquith.

Mr. Bonar Law charged the government with trading upon the loyalty of the Unionists to their country, and said that Mr. Redmond had made a greater

LONG SEMI-FITTING COAT.

A new model for the fall coat, featuring the mannish effect so much in vogue. It is long and close-fitting and buttons in single-breasted fashion.

The rivalry between the long, tight-fitting coat and the short, round coat is growing, and there are hosts of admirers of both designs. The long model is shown here to splendid advantage, being single-breasted and trimmed with a notched collar, revers and cuffs of its own material. Serge, velvet, broadcloth or gabardine may be employed in developing the coat. The collar and cuffs may be of silk if preferred. To make the coat will require 3 yards of 44-inch or 3 1/2 yards of 46-inch material. One-half yard less material will be needed if the coat is of shorter length.

The cutting is a rather ambitious process for the home dressmaker, but may be accomplished if care is exercised. The back is laid on a 23 Centimeter, and next to it, running along the edge, but not on the fold, comes the underfacing. The front and side front are placed above the back, and along a lengthwise thread the cuff, pocket flap, collar, side back and sleeve sections.

Now, for the making, first form dart at upper edge of front, creasing on line of single "o" perforations and stitch 1/4 inch in at upper edge of dart and graduate seam into nothing at lower edge. Adjust underfacing to position underneath front in front of side front and back to side back as notched. Pleat, creasing on slot perforation, side front to armhole, and "o" perforations in back and press. Close under-arm seam as notched, close shoulder seam. Center-front indicated by large "o" perforations. Close back seam of collar (indicated by single "o" perforation), and if desired, crease over waistline, bias material. Sew to neck edge as notched; roll collar and front on double "o" perforation.

Close sleeve seams as notched, easing any fullness between notches at elbow. Close cuff seams as notched to underfacing, sew to sleeves as notched. Sew sleeves in armholes, inside seam at notch in front easing in any fullness.




FIG. 22—BACK MATERIAL, WITH W. 5806. Sizes 14, 16, 18 and 20 years or 32, 34 and 36 bust. Price, 15 cents.

Moncton, Sept. 15.—At a largely attended convention of the Liberal party of Westmorland county held in Moncton this afternoon, A. B. Copp, ex-M. P., was nominated as party standard bearer for the by-election necessitated by the death of Hon. H. R. Emmerson.

Hints for the Cook

Minute Pudding

Put 1 quart of water in a double boiler and 1 heaping teaspoon salt. When boiling hard stir in enough flour to make quite stiff. The flour must be added slowly, stirring hard the while. When well cooked, put a pudding mold, turn into 2 cups of shortening. Boil the rest of the shortening with the milk and water, then pour into the flour and knead well. Break into small pieces to allow to cool. Either pour or roll out for tin, fill with 1 1/2 pounds pork cut into small pieces. Add a little gelatine and water, salt and pepper to taste. Decorate top of pie and gloss with beaten egg. Bake 2 1/2 to 3 hours.

FOR BIGGER CROPS.

Calgary, Sept. 16.—To increase the acreage under crop next year in Alberta, an unusual proposition is being made by which the government, acting through local organizations, shall assist the farmers with men with can plough or drive horses and by utilizing otherwise idle animals and equipment to make ready now for the spring a very considerable acreage from which this season's crop has been garnered.

It is contended that even if the government assumed the cost of work, taking a share of the crop, as is customary among individuals working on this plan, that the venture would be a profitable one, to say nothing of the benefits accruing to the country generally.
