(Canadian Press) London, Dec. 10.—An enormous amount of insurance covering risks of war and civil commotion has been effected during the last few days on property on the Galician frontier, dividing Russia from Austria-Hungary. Underwriters in London are astonished at the flow of business, which they describe as the most extensive ever placed in connection with any crisis.

FREE TRADE RESOLUTION IS CARRIED IN SASKATCHEWAN Opposition Amendment to Await Report of Tariff Commission Defeated 25 to 3

Regina, Sask., Dec. 10.—The adjourned debate on the free trade resolution of Mr. Robinson, member for Regina, terminated yesterday when the resolution was passed on a straight party vote, 25 to 2. An amendment was moved by Mr. W. J. Loughery, leader of the opposition, urging that no tariff changes be made pending the submission of the report of the tariff commission.

NEW ENGLAND URGING RAILWAY INVESTIGATION Washington, Dec. 10.—Official representatives from practically all the New England States will appear before the rules committee of the house today to urge the passage of a resolution introduced by Representative O'Shaughnessy of Rhode Island to authorize an investigation of alleged violations of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law by the New York, New Haven & Hartford and Grand Trunk railroads.

BISHOP LeBLANC IS CONSECRATED Imposing Ceremony in Cathedral Thronged to the Doors by Great Congregation and With Many Prelates Taking Part—Dinner in Honor of Apostolic Delegate

With imposing ceremonial in the presence of a gathering which filled the cathedral to the doors, with His Excellency Most Rev. P. Siani, apostolic delegate, officiating, Right Rev. Edward LeBlanc was elevated to the episcopate as Bishop of St. John, this morning. It was a memorable event in the history of the Catholic church in the lower provinces and the spectacle presented in the Cathedral was such as few see more than once in the ordinary lifetime.

At the conclusion of the ceremony in the Cathedral, all the clergy members adjourned to the large class room of the monastery of the Holy Spirit, where they had fallen upon one who had shown his zeal for the faith in a wider field than that of his own diocese.

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BRITAIN READY TO ARBITRATE Formal Statement by Sir Edward Grey on Canal Matters CHANGE OF PRESIDENTS Manchester Guardian Says Wilson's Incoming "Gives Better Chance For Fair and Unbiased Hearings of Contentions"

(Canadian Press) London, Dec. 10.—A despatch from Sir Edward Grey, British foreign secretary, to Right Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador at Washington, about the Panama Canal act and its discrimination in favor of American coastwise vessels, is published as follows:— "His Majesty's government regard the equality of all nations as the fundamental principle underlying the treaty of 1801 in the same way as the basis of the Suez Canal convention in 1858. They do not seek to deprive the United States of any liberty which is open either to themselves or any other nation, nor do they either in the letter or the spirit of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty any surrender or other concession of power of the right to encourage its shipping and commerce by subsidies as it may deem expedient.

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YARMOUTH IN FIVE GRIP Several Buildings Destroyed in Conflagration This Morning—Started in Garage

(Special to Times) Yarmouth, N. S., Dec. 10.—The worst fire which has taken place in Yarmouth in many years broke out about four o'clock this morning in Barrow's garage, corner of Central and Harbour streets. There was a heavy wind and the flames communicated to the Queen Hotel, thence to adjoining houses and buildings. The garage of the Queen Hotel, eight rooms, a blacksmith shop in Main street, were badly damaged, and although the fire was now under control, the Yarmouth Light newspaper office is still burning.

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EMBRACED AS ARMISTICE WAS ALL ARRANGED Scene of Interest as Allies and Turkey Came To Agreement UNDER GREAT TENSION Outburst of Emotion as Last Difficulty Was Overcome—"To the Health of the Valiant Bulgarian Army," Nazim Pasha's Toast

(Canadian Press) London, Dec. 10.—The correspondence of the Daily Telegraph at Thessalonica sends a graphic account of the meeting of the plenipotentiaries of Turkey and the allies to sign the armistice. The Bulgarian delegate passed trains laden with provisions and arms through Constantinople, and the correspondent was for a long time a stumbling block. Then after a long silence Nazim Pasha suddenly exclaimed: "Well let it be so, but wait ten days before sending your trains through; wait for the beginning of the peace negotiations at London."

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
