## LOCAL NEWS

**GRAND BAY CASE.**  
It is expected that a police constable will come to the city this afternoon to take to Grand Bay, Bruno Kingman, a German who was arrested on charges of leaving into summer houses there. He will be taken to Grand Bay for a preliminary hearing and later to Hamilton for trial.

**MRS. ISAAC THOMPSON.**  
The death of Mrs. Annie Thompson, widow of Isaac Thompson, occurred last night at the Home for Incapables. She was born in Cumberland, Eng. Three nephews, Isaac, William P. and James H., all of this city, survive. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the home of Isaac Thompson in Broad street.

**BY-LAW CASES.**  
The case in which W. Vanwart is charged with forestalling in the market, was to have come up for hearing today, but was further adjourned.

Christie Kane pleaded guilty to smoking in the market and was fined \$2.

John Doyle, charged with trespassing on the I. C. R. property near the Ballast wharf, was told that he was liable to a fine of \$20, and was allowed to go on condition that he did not trespass in future.

**SALE OF NORTH END PROPERTY AT CORNER DOES NOT HOLD GOOD.**

Important Judgment by Chief Justice in These Days of Real Estate Transactions

The January sitting of the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, was held this morning, Chief Justice Barker presiding. An important judgment was given in the case of Elizabeth K. J. Porter vs. Lee Johnston Rogers, the bill being dismissed with costs. This was a suit brought to enforce specific performance of a contract of sale of real estate. The plaintiff, through Auctioneer Potts, offered for sale at Clubb's Corner a certain property, described as the property at 171 Chesley street. The defendant, through his solicitor, thinking the property fronted on Chesley street, bid it in at \$875. Later it was discovered that the property did not front on Chesley street, but was in an alley known as Slab Alley, and was known as 171 Chesley street only in the city directory. The defendant refused to carry out the contract, and this suit was brought for its enforcement.

His Honor held that, there being a misdescription of the property, and the defendant having purchased on the faith of this description, the contract was not binding. At the time of the sale a \$200 check was given in part payment, but payment on this check was stopped. An action was brought in the county court to recover the amount of the check, and the trial was postponed pending the decision in this case in chancery. It is said to be unlikely that the check will now be paid.

A. B. M. Baxter, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. M. G. Teed, K.C., and W. J. Maloney for the defendant. In the case of Margaret Robertson vs. James Gordon Forbes, administrator of the estate of Robert Reed, on petition of the defendant, His Honor this morning gave an order for the sale of two lots of land which were not administered at the time of the administration of the rest of the estate, having been discovered as part of the estate only since that time. An order was given on May 13, 1882, for the sale of all real estate which Robert Reed owned at the time of his death, to satisfy certain claims. A judgment claim of Mary A. Duncan, which was only partially satisfied, was later assigned to Robert Reed Duncan and by him devised to Agnes Duncan, his wife. The proceeds of the sale of the land, after paying costs of sale and costs of this application, are to be paid on the balance of the judgment. W. A. Ewing, K.C., appeared for the petitioner.

The case of the Attorney-General vs. The St. John Lumber Company, Teed vs. Shannon, and Grant vs. Lawton, were also stood over until the next meeting of the court.

## FORTY DOLLARS OR FOUR MONTHS' JAIL

A Lecture to Old Courtmen on Behaviour While in St. John

"You will have to learn that there is law in Canada and that we in this country are not going to tolerate a lot of rowdies who came out from the old country and that, that you can do as you like." This is part of a lecture given by Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning to two young Englishmen, John Moran and Charles Spencer, charged with assaulting John Kilburn in the Seaman's Institute and with fighting in the street. They pleaded not guilty, but on the strength of evidence submitted, they were adjudged to be guilty, and each fined \$40 or two months in jail on the first charge, and \$8 or two months on the second.

John Lynch, charged with being drunk and using obscene language was fined \$4 for ten days in jail for the drunkenness, and \$8 or two months for the bad language.

Hector Napper, charged with using profane language, was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

John Fyfe, charged with wandering about the streets and not giving a satisfactory account of himself, was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

## WINTERPORT NOTES

The Allan liner Tunisian, under charter to the C. P. R., arrived in Halifax early this morning. She is due to arrive here tomorrow afternoon. The first and second cabin passengers will likely land at Halifax. There are 500 passengers.

The S. S. Manchester inventor is not yet arrived at Halifax yet.

According to a cable received here, the Donaldson liner Leitta suffered considerable damage on her last voyage from this port. She encountered very rough weather. She will not sail from Glasgow until March 1.

The Donaldson liner Laconia is due to arrive here this week.

## NEW LIFE INTO WORK OF BOARD

Progress Campaign in St. John Begun

EXPERTS HERE TO ADVISE

Citizen's Committee Also to Lead Aid-Luncheon on Friday and Then Talk Over The Work That is to be Done

A new stimulus to the progress of St. John is to be given by the Board of Trade, which is planning a series of greater activity and greater usefulness than during any period of its history. The assistance of an expert was sought with the result that H. V. Chase with two assistants, F. W. Bender and A. D. McMillan, arrived in St. John yesterday to lend their energies to the work.

At a meeting of the council of the board last evening the plans were discussed and the outline of the arrangements for a vigorous campaign was drawn. The aim is to re-create the Board of Trade upon a scale of wider usefulness and to put it upon a solid business basis which will enable the members to undertake and execute the work which they have ahead of them, to study the city and present conditions, to learn what it is the city needs most and how to get it.

To accomplish this it was decided to make the movement a general one and all the citizens, whether members of the board or not, will be asked to lend their co-operation. For this purpose a Citizens' Committee was appointed to work with the council and to direct the new undertakings.

The council of the board which is responsible for the arrangements for the campaign consists of—J. M. Robinson, president; J. A. Lively, vice-president; J. B. M. Baxter, W. F. Barlett, F. de la Clemente, M. W. Doherty, W. E. Foster, C. W. Hallamore, J. L. McVitty, A. E. Masie, H. P. Robinson, P. B. Schofield, H. C. Schofield, Louis Simus, P. W. Thomson, J. A. Tilton, W. H. Thorne and J. Hunter White.

The new members of the Citizens' Committee, who will work with the council and give the benefit of their advice and council are as follows—Walter Allison, A. M. Belling, T. B. Blair, R. H. Braue, E. The council and the committee will get together on Friday at one o'clock when they will have lunch and then proceed to a more definite consideration of the plans for the work.

Mr. Chase has just come from New York where he took part in a campaign which added 2,000 members to the New York Merchants' Association and which greatly related their work. The experience which he and his associates have had in more than sixty campaigns of various kinds all over the United States and western Canada has given them a far insight into the possibilities of board of trade work. Mr. Chase also is full of enthusiasm regarding the possibilities of this city.

This morning he gave out the following statement:

"It has been predicted that St. John after an honorable and upright career of many years is on the eve of an awakening."

"We believe so."

"The spirit of 'boos' flourishes in an atmosphere like St. John's—an atmosphere generated through balmy breezes from three miles of water light fuller of fog traffic possibilities than that possessed by any other city of our size in the Dominion of Canada, fed by an equal number of great railroad systems. With more than a score of mills and corporations, and a variety of industrial establishments, what more could a city desire for an argument with which to launch a Greater St. John movement."

"One may say—'We want a spirit of co-operation manifest, a disposition to meet a possible leading manufacturer half way, which, interpreted, means the making of a price on a vacant property not prohibitive.'"

"This one thing will be the means of assisting the Board of Trade wonderfully in a campaign for new industries. Its absence will lose good opportunities."

"Let us then get together and pull together for St. John. If there is any sort of well ordered, safely outlined, plan afoot, to spread the gospel of 'Boos St. John,' let us all pull out our coats and show the world that, though we may not be so large in commercial area as our honorable career might warrant, we make atonement in quality of citizenship which is, after all, the lowest commercial asset with which we are acquainted."

"Get together; pull together, and with St. John's undoubted advantages, we shall see a new St. John."
