Menace to Navigation. Boston Globe, Friday.—A section of the wreck of the large Whitman, which was stranded on Devil's Back, at the entrance to Broad Sound, several months ago, is floating in Broad Sound, a dangerous menace to navigation, according to the report of Capt. Hudkins of the ocean tug Piedmont, which came in today from Baltimore with three loaded barges in tow. Capt. Hudkins said he passed the side of the wreck about 200 yards east of Deer Island light. It was floating directly in the fairway, and in the track of shipping coming through Broad Sound. Capt. H. M. Broadbent, in charge of the revenue cutter service, in this district, was notified by the marine department of the Chamber of Commerce, and a cutter will probably be sent down to remove the obstruction.
