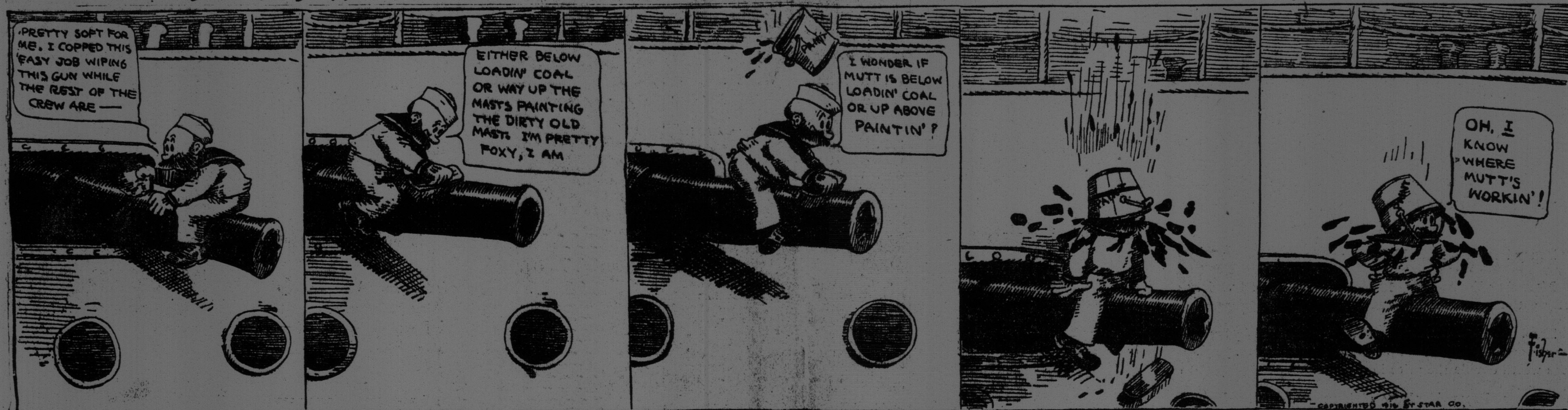

Al Sweet was on the mound for the locals, and he had his opponents at his mercy all through the game. He allowed only six hits off his delivery and he had nine strikeouts to his credit.

Queal Won a Great Race.

Toronto, June 23—Billy Queal, the Yankee champion, won the five-mile professional championship race at the Grand stadium Saturday night, with Ted Wood second and Tom Longshot third. They were the only starters. Shurbluffs' ankle, injured two weeks ago, having failed to heal, while Al Rains broke down in training last week and Swabbers, the Sreeds, withdrew.

Wood led for the first mile, which was run in 4:49. Queal set the pace for the second mile, time 9:33, and kept up the terrific grind until the third mile. Time, 14:40. Wood and Longshot were right at his heels, and Wood took the lead for the fourth, but his fierce spurs failed to shake off the others. The four miles were run in 19:22. The last mile was slower, as the racers were watching each other.

In the last lap Longshot found the pace too hot and stopped in the back stretch. Queal caught Wood at the head of the stretch, but twenty yards from the tape he was seized with a cramp and faltered, but staved off Wood and won in 24:30 2-5, the fastest ever run in America.

Queal was carried off exhausted. Wood could barely stagger, while Longshot was overcome by nausea.

The ten-mile team race was won easily by the Indian team, Red Hawk and Allan Hawk. The Irish-Canadian team, Meadows and O'Brien, narrowly beat out the Toronto team, Sellen and Roe, for second.

Olympic Games Entries a Record Breaker.

Stockholm, June 23—The number of entries for the Olympic games is greater than on any previous occasion. Seventeen heats and two qualifying rounds will be necessary to reduce the field of ninety-five entered for the 100 metre dash to the six men entitled to compete in the final.

One hundred men are entered for the 200 metre dash; 25 will contest in the 400 metre event, and 72 in the 800 metres.

The classic Marathon will bring together 72 contenders. Nine nations will be represented in the 3,000 metres team race, while teams representing the United States, Russia, Italy, Hungary, England, Canada, Germany, France, Austria and Sweden, will match speed and staying powers in the 10,000 metres relay. The relay dash of 400 metres will have teams competing from the United States, Hungary, Austria, Germany, Bohemia, England, Russia, Norway, Canada, France, Italy and Sweden.

A long distance motor boat race is scheduled for July 1. The course will be from Gaspetown to Millidgeville.

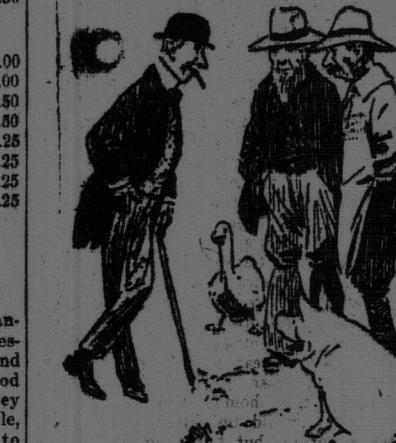
