

## IMPERIAL IN SPRING ATTIRE

Theatre Presents Attractive  
Appearance—Fine Bill in  
Keeping With Adorn-  
ments.

Fresh from the hands of renovators, drapery experts and stage artists, the Imperial Theatre struck a spring-time note yesterday that must have inspired encouragement and warm-weather hopes in the hearts of every patron in spite of the wintry out-of-doors, while its screen programme certainly imparted a moral stimulus in keeping with the spirit of the season.

Peterson of the Keith house have become almost immune to surprise in the matter of decorative effects and attractive stage settings, yet on approaching the theatre yesterday the new chintz window-drapes, flower-bedecked doorway curtains, rich madras surrounding the foyer mirrors had an enlivening effect. After the preliminary reels, which include a truly unusual scenic entitled "Frolics of the Front King," a social story of very powerful effect, is screened under the title, "What's Wrong With the Women?"

It is a big theme upon which this dramatic subject is founded. It deals not merely with individuals. Mr. Goodman, who wrote and also produced it, goes beyond the little group of interesting characters with which he tells his story. He treats his theme in a big way and makes of it a huge canvas upon which he depicts with bold strokes the eternal struggle of the sexes.

Woman, the picture shows, is essentially good. But when the forces of extravagance and folly enter the home and take the place of love and understanding, destiny imposes a heavy toll.

The story has to do with the lives of men and women of wealth and social position and others of lesser influence who seek to move in the world of the rich. A young business man and his devoted wife live happily with their baby. The wife is led innocently into a fast circle in which she is almost engulfed. Troubles follow.

Among the prominent players in the cast are Wilson Lackey, long famous on stage and screen; Barbara Cartleton, Constance Bennett, Montagu Love, Julia Swayne Gordon, Munley Gordon, Hal Aldrich, and Oscar Hammerstein and others.

This same fine programme is being continued today and in addition to the evening there will be the first of Imperial's bi-weekly concerts to take place between 8 and 9:15 o'clock. There will be two shows of pictures. The programme for this concert will consist of three orchestral numbers and two solos by Mr. Lawrence, of Montreal, whose splendid baritone has been heard in some musical circles of this city already.

## MEASLES SRUM REPORTED TO GIVE FULL IMMUNITY

Paris, April 3.—Dr. Mery, director of the Emile Zola Hospital for Children at Meulan, has reported to the Academy of Medicine the discovery of a protective serum against measles. The serum is taken from the blood of children who have just recovered from the disease, and inoculation with it seems to afford a certain though probably only temporary immunity against contagion.

The method is based on the results of the researches of Charles Nicolle, director of the Pasteur Institute in Tunis, who has shown that by the injection of the serum of convalescents children as well as adults can be protected against an outbreak of measles. Dr. Mery had occasion to keep within bounds by this method two epidemics. It was shown that an injection made at the beginning of the incubation time and the breaking out of the disease—was followed by a mild development of the disease.




