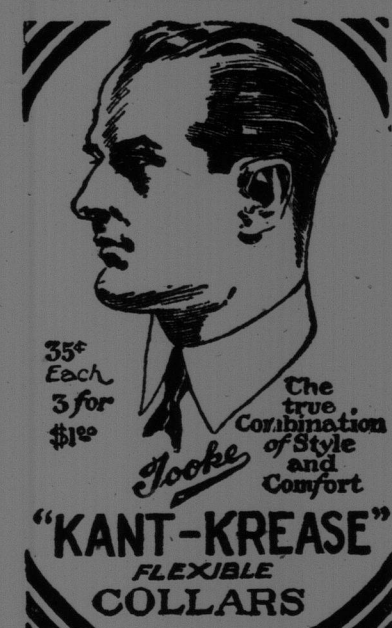

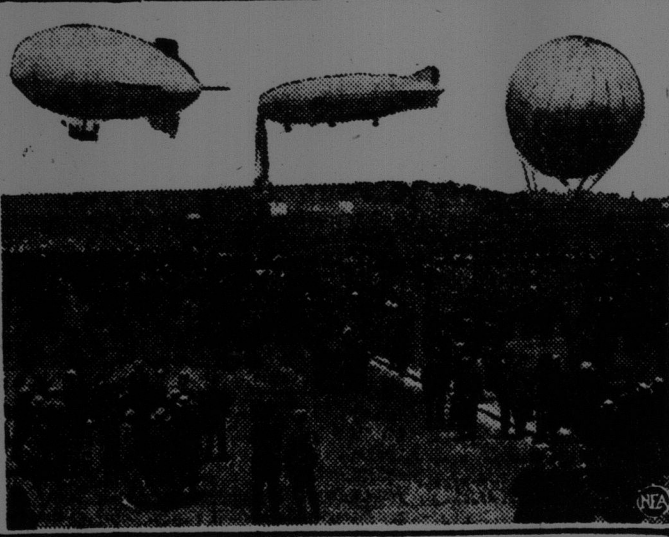
Juvenile Court Committee

forward a list of their appointed representatives by that time.

E. C. Weyman reported on the conference held with the legal committee of the Trades and Labor Council with regard to the Council's objections to clauses in the Children's Protective Act which would come into effect were a Juvenile Court established.

Those who met with the legal committee of the Trades and Labor Council, besides Mr. Weyman, were A. R. Crookshank, A. M. Belding, Rev. Geo. Scott and A. I. Machum. The conference had been entirely harmonious. Many of the uncertainties and objects of the Trade and Labor Council representatives were cleared up and certain points were to be given further consideration. The legal committee was to report back to the Trades and Labor Council and return with a report from the Council to the Juvenile Court committee.

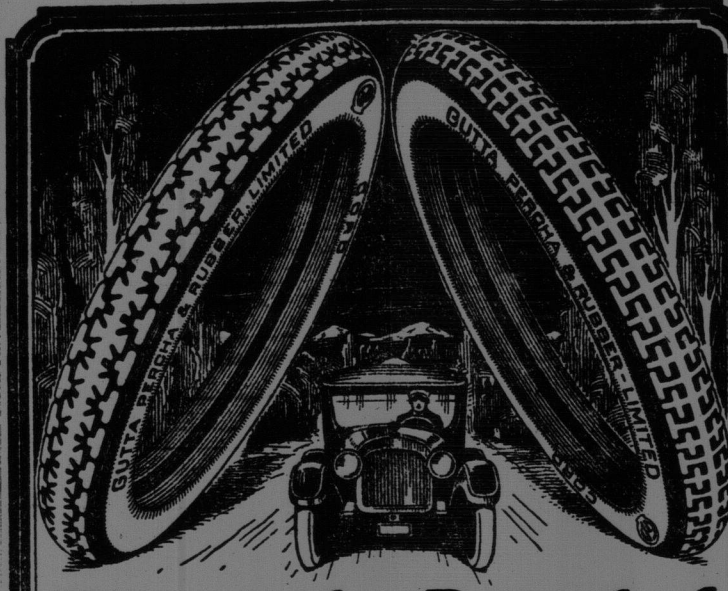

for Porter, Hatfield and Gallagher, cleared on Monday.
R. K. Tracey, M. L. A., Centreville,

who spent considerable time here this winter supervising the shipments for Porter, Hatfield and Gallagher, estimated last evening that 600,000 barrels of potatoes had passed through St. John this season bound for the Havana market. This was a considerably greater quantity than had been shipped during the winter and spring of 1922-23, Mr. Tracey said.

In reviewing the last season, Mr. Tracey said that the farmers were exceptionally lucky. Last summer had been a good one for the crop, which were very fruitful. Practically all the potatoes grown had been sold, and all at good prices.

The price was better during 1923-24 than during 1922-23, he said, because of the fact that it did not vary to any extent, always keeping about the same level.

The farmers of the province, he said, were planting more potatoes for seed potatoes than ever before, but only the greatest of care would make the yield good. Not a few farmers this year were trying seed potatoes for the first time, and not being familiar with the process were likely to make some had mistakes unless carefully supervised, he said.

Asked concerning the possibility of the backward spring and continued cold and wet weather having any bad effect on the crop this year, he said that if it did not continue he did not think that so far the weather had any ill effect on potatoes other than that it would keep the crop late.

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR BANQUETED HERE

Edwin A. Evans, of Quebec, Supreme Grand Master of the Knights Templar for Canada, accompanied by the Grand Chancellor, W. H. A. Eckhardt, of Montreal, arrived in the city yesterday on an official visit. A special session of St. John DeMolay Preceptory was held in the lodge rooms, Masonic Temple, Germain street, last night to welcome them.

After an address of welcome was delivered by His Worship Mayor F. L. Potts, who also presented the keys of the city to the guests, a session of the lodge was held, after which the visitors were entertained at a banquet at which Supreme Grand Master Evans was the chief speaker. He thanked the St. John Knights for their hearty welcome and then addressed the members on lodge work.

The Supreme Grand Master and Grand Chancellor are making an official tour of the lower provinces, and will leave tomorrow morning on the steamer Empress for Yarmouth, after which they will proceed to Halifax, Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island, then to Moncton on their way back to Quebec.
