WILKIE IS ACCUSED

Coroner's Jury Blames Him For Death of Wife.

BEATING HASTENED DEATH

Toronto Laborer, Who Attacked Woman, Is Charged by Inquest Jury and Frank Perry, the Italian Accused of Striking Her, Is Exonerated—Witnesses Give Further Evidence Against Wilkie.

Toronto, Aug. 30.—"We find that Ellen Wilkie came to her death on Aug. 14, 1911, at 244 Clarence street, from the effect of injuries received from the hands of her husband, Edward Wilkie. We exonerate Frank Perry from any implication in her death."

This was the verdict of the jury at the inquest held at the morgue yesterday afternoon by Coroner Graham, regarding the death of Mrs. Ellen Wilkie.

Martin McManus, 2 Fredrick place, testified that on Aug. 14, about 11 p.m., he saw Wilkie and wife struggling on the door step. Mrs. Wilkie was dragged into the house by the hair. He heard her screaming and soon after a little girl came out of the house crying that her mother was being killed by her father. Two policemen then appeared on the scene, and the witness ran for a doctor. On returning he entered the house and found the woman lying on the floor and Wilkie beside her crying, "Oh, Nellie, Nellie!"

P. C. Kennedy, No. 116, testified that Wilkie had come to him about 6:30 p.m. and complained that his sister-in-law, Mrs. Crawford, was bringing in whisky to his wife. He at once went to the Wilkie home and found Mrs. Wilkie very excited. Wilkie and his wife were quarreling in his presence, but no blows were struck. An empty whisky bottle lay on the table. P. C. Charles W. Johnson was notified of the disturbance at the Wilkie home about 10 p.m. Arriving there he found Wilkie and wife scuffling. Mrs. Wilkie asked him not to leave because her husband had been abusing her all night. After having quieted matters, he left about 11:10.

P. C. Joseph McElroy arrived at the Wilkie home about 11:30. Mrs. Wilkie had blood on her face and was bleeding at the nose, and complained that Wilkie had abused her, repeatedly exclaiming, "He beat me and choked me." She announced her intention of laying a charge against her husband, but soon after collapsed and died. Mrs. Mary Moore, 8 Fredrick place, merely further verified the evidence of the constables.

Dr. S. Singer, 194 Simcoe street, who performed the post-mortem, testified that Mrs. Wilkie had suffered from heart disease. He believed the treatment that she received on the night of her death would and did hasten her death.

Frank Perry, a neighbor of the Wilkies, testified that Wilkie's stepdaughter had called him in to separate the struggle in which her father and mother were engaged. He testified that he merely acted as peace-maker, and did not, as alleged, strike Mrs. Wilkie.

Beattie Murder Trial. Chesterfield, Ont. House, Va., Aug. 30.—Paul D. Beattie, cousin of Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., indicted for wife murder, remained unmoved yesterday under a volley of questions from counsel for the defense, who attempted to shake the witness story of Monday, in which he introduced an alleged confession to him by the prisoner concerning the slaying.

John Sandifer, an intimate friend of the prisoner for several years, who accompanied the latter to Harry M. Sullivan, who received him after the murder, followed Paul Beattie on the witness stand for the prosecution. He was expected to confirm the testimony given by the prisoner, who testified that night to Paul to ask the latter to carry a message to Beulah Binford. He did not do so, and failed to give any light on the subject and practically became a witness for the defense. Sandifer testified that the relations of Henry C. Beattie, Jr., with his wife were pleasant so far as he knew.

HON. MR. PATERSON AT WOODSTOCK

Gave a Clear and Concise Explanation of Reciprocity Pact—A Challenge That Was Not Accepted.

Woodstock, Aug. 29.—It was a large and very enthusiastic audience which listened to Hon. William Paterston here tonight, when he came to speak to the electors on reciprocity and to support the candidature of Mr. E. W. Nesbitt in North Oxford and Mr. M. S. Baber in South Oxford. The Opera House was filled to overflowing, and apart from two or three of the anti-reciprocity party, who stayed at the back and made a few remarks, there were no interruptions. Good attention was given throughout. A statement made by Mr. Nesbitt, that the United States was the greatest country in the world, provoked some discussion, and what was simply a challenge, while his statement that he simply meant the largest purchasing country the audience was once more in entire accord with him.

Mr. Paterston gave a clear and concise explanation of how the pact was made, saying that it found Canada to be a very important market for the United States, and that it was simply a proposition framed by Mr. Fielding and himself and made before the representatives of the people. He challenged anyone to show how it could be harmful, but no one took up the challenge, while his statement that it would benefit producers, manufacturers and consumers was greeted with cheers.

There was no mistaking the feeling of the audience, and the speaker concluded men of all classes. On the platform were some of the most influential manufacturers in the city, while in the body of the house were old-time Conservatives, who applauded the speaker and his sentiments. In concluding his speech Mr. Paterston complimented Sir Wilfrid Laurier as the man who had during his whole term of office sought to unite all factions and erode, and had been true to the best traditions of a Britisher. He deplored the untruthful statements made against this great man in Quebec where he was said to be a traitor to his compatriots and his religion, and in Ontario, where he was accused of being anti-British.

The speaker was a most successful and inspiring one.

BELIEVE THERE IS GANG

NEW YORK POLICE TACKLE WORK OF BREAKING UP BLACK-MAILING SCHEME.

New York, August 29.—The police attacked the problem of restoring two kidnapped Italian children today with the belief that they had to deal with an organized gang operating under the auspices of the black hand. Four weeks ago Vincenzo Sabella disappeared and the weeks later little Peter Quartararo vanished while playing in the street, and afterwards their parents received a number of letters demanding \$10,000 for young Sabella and \$10,000 for young Quartararo. The letters, signed with the skull and cross bones and smeared, apparently with blood, finally caused the terrible suspense and concern over their dread of the Italian secret society, and report the cases to the police. Neither made any effort to comply with the demands of the kidnappers, although Sabella is said to be wealthy.

The letters in both cases were worded practically the same.

HAD A WARM TIME

Cahill Supporters Disturb Meeting in Pontiac.

THREE MEN ARE INJURED

Adherents of Unofficial Candidate Jeer at Sir Alan Aylesworth and Hon. Sydney Fisher at Stormy Session—Blood Is Freely Shed by Members of the Rival Factions In Conflict—Two Arrested.

Shawville, Que., Aug. 30.—There was a hot time at the meeting held at Campbell's Bay in Pontiac County last night when Sir Alan Aylesworth and Hon. Sydney Fisher held a meeting in behalf of G. F. Hodgins, one of the Liberal candidates. The meeting resolved itself into a free fight between the supporters of Mr. Hodgins and Frank S. Cahill, the other Liberal candidate. The members of the Cahill faction jeered and hissed the Ministers.

At one time in the course of the meeting, which was the stormiest witnessed in this county since away back in the eighties, Hon. Sydney Fisher endeavored to explain to the audience that he was the bearer to them of a message from Sir Wilfrid Laurier to support Mr. Hodgins, but his voice was drowned by an angry chorus of cries, "We want the right to choose our own man. Tell Sir Wilfrid that."

Every effort has been made to induce Mr. Cahill to retire from the field, but he stoutly refuses to do so. Saturday night Sir Wilfrid Laurier summoned both candidates to Montreal, and in an interview at which Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux was present, endeavored to have Cahill retire in favor of Hodgins. It was immediately arranged that Sir Alan Aylesworth and Hon. Sydney Fisher should go to the county and speak in Mr. Hodgins' behalf. Special trains bearing the Ministers and several other speakers, including Dr. Gaboury, M.P.P. for Pontiac, came up from Ottawa in the morning. Mr. Cahill, however, called a counter demonstration and ran special trains from Ottawa and from different parts of the county crowded with his supporters.

Several free fights had by this time sprung up, and the crowd, surging in all directions, refused to listen further to the speakers.

In the fight that ensued three men were seriously injured and blood was freely shed.

Two arrests were made by the local constables.

Last evening Messrs. Aylesworth and Fisher spoke to two small meetings in Shawville.

Abolish Conciliation Board.

London, Aug. 30.—The Royal Commission, which is investigating the railway strike held its second session yesterday. Fox, secretary of the Society of Locomotive Engineers, gave evidence as to the failure of conciliation boards to achieve the purpose for which they were authorized. He suggested that they be abolished, and that hereafter, when disputes arise, complaints be first submitted to the local officers of the company where the trouble occurred. Then, if the matter is not settled, it should be brought to a general meeting of men of the grade concerned, to elect a deputation to meet the management of the company, together with the trade union officers.

U. S. Trade.

Washington, Aug. 30.—American exports of all kinds for July were \$13,000,000 greater than in July, 1910. Figures given out by the Department of Commerce and Labor yesterday show exports of \$127,704,119 and imports of \$115,165,406 in July, 1911, compared with exports of \$114,627,492 and imports of \$117,315,591 in July of last year.

Labor Pickets Fined.

Montreal, Aug. 30.—Judgment was given by Magistrate McMahon in the Westmount police court yesterday regarding the five carpenters who were arrested three weeks ago in Westmount, on a charge of loitering and intimidation, when acting as pickets during the carpenters' strike. Magistrate McMahon found the men guilty and sentenced them to pay between them a fine of \$10, this amount to cover costs. Mr. Archambault gave notice of appeal on behalf of the carpenters.

Agricultural Machinery In Russia.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 30.—The Minister of Commerce has submitted to the Council a bill which will be introduced in the Duma providing measures to foster the manufacture of agricultural machinery in Russia. It is proposed to permit duty free the entry of certain machines and machine parts and to offer manufacturers credit on easy terms and reduce taxes in their favor.

WHITNEY WELL RECEIVED.

The Premier of Ontario Holds Meeting In Georgetown.

Georgetown, Aug. 30.—Sir James Whitney was greeted here last night by a gathering of over 2,000 people. On his arrival a monster procession was formed, headed by the 20th Regiment band, and marched to the Drill Shed, which was filled to overflowing.

Mr. J. A. Willoughby was chairman, and Dr. A. W. Nixon, M.P.P., and D. Henderson, the Conservative candidate for Halton, were among those on the platform.

Sir James Whitney was greeted with loud cheering as he rose to address the assembly. It was his second visit to Georgetown, and he was pleased, he said, to be in a county that produced such men as Mr. Henderson, Dr. Nixon and J. R. Barber. He was here to do his duty, and he proceeded to strongly criticize the reciprocity treaty, which the Laurier Government, he contended, proposed forcing on the people of Canada.

Canada was prosperous now, and he did not believe Canadians would hand over their prosperity to the United States. In closing he asked the electors to support Mr. Henderson by voting in their own interests and defeating a treaty which would mean ruin to the markets of the farm-ers. The Premier was loudly cheered. Little Miss Elliott presented him with a bouquet.

Suspicious Circumstances.

St. Catharines, Aug. 30.—No light is thrown on the mysterious circumstances surrounding the death of Geo. Hodgkinson at Merritt last Friday, at the inquest which was resumed last evening before Coroner Joy. Medical testimony showed that death was due to drowning, and that the wounds found on the head and shoulder had been received before death and probably after the body entered the water, which was probably at the bridge near McLean's sawmill. Although deceased drew \$31.65 the day before the drowning, no one had seen him spend much money the last night he was seen. The suspicious circumstances regarding the pockets being turned inside out remain unsolved. One witness, Charles Dodd, stated that when returning home at 1 o'clock he saw two strangers lying asleep near the town line crossing not far from the spot where the deceased was last seen by his brother.

The inquest was adjourned until Sept. 12 to give the police a chance to solve the problem regarding the pockets and wounds.

Lightning Struck Funeral.

Georgetown, Aug. 30.—As the casket containing the body of Stephen Mastowicz, ticket seller in the ill-fated moving picture show, was being borne to the grave in the cemetery here lightning struck a tree under which the procession was passing, and the six pall-bearers were knocked down. John Holie, a brother-in-law of the deceased, was rendered unconscious, and the mourners were panic-stricken. The casket dropped into the mud where it lay until the party had recovered from the shock. Holie was not seriously injured, but it was necessary to remove him from the cemetery in a carriage.
