## MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN

Workingmen's Candidates are All Making the Fight Warm for the Others.

### GET OUT AND WORK

Is What Every Worker Must Do on New Year's Day and Success is Assured

Some things to be remembered in the voting are that you have three votes for aldermen in each ward, but that you cannot mark more than one cross after each of these names if you wish to vote for three, one cross after each of two names if you wish to vote for only two and one cross after one name if you wish to vote only for one candidate.

For the Board of Control you have four votes only, and you can put your four crosses after one name or two each after any two names or three to one and one to another or one each to any four, or two to one and one each to any other two. You can divide them any way you choose, so long as you put more than four crosses on your ballot.

For the Board of Education you have twelve crosses to dispose of with only one provision that you cannot put any more than three crosses after any one candidate's name. You can vote for twelve men if you wish, giving one to each man or in any other way you please, so long as you do not put more than three crosses on your ballot nor more than three after any name.

Workingmen should not fail to vote their own ticket. The other fellows will be looked after by their friends.

A vote for principle is never lost.

Forget the individuality of the Labor candidates for a moment if they are not all that you like, and make your mark on the ballot for principle.

The fight grows warm, and the Labor men are sticking together.

Labor has been satisfied to accept small gifts in the past. This order is to be changed on New Year's Day and thereafter. For the future they must have their rights.

If you refuse to fight for yourself never again blame others because you cannot get what you want.

Secure the election of your own. Think the best of the other fellows after.

Don't forget Ald. Bell in Ward Five. He must be elected together with the Labor candidate, Ald. Woods. Labor has had no more consistent friend in the Council than Ald. Bell.

The four Labor men for the Board of Education may not be 6-4-2-1 legalities, nor financiers, nor educationists, but they are men of common sense and good judgment, and deserve your vote in preference to the classes we speak of.

Vote early, but only once. The Labor party stands for cleanliness above everything else.

E. J. Hearn, the aldermanic candidate in Ward Four, is not a scab painter, but a barrister, and would make a very fair friend of organized labor if chosen for the Council.

Ex-Ald. Geo. McMurich in Ward Three would be a very good man for the Laboring man to leave at home. His past record in the Council has nothing to commend it to the workingmen.

The firemen will no doubt remember John Shaw's celebrated deal with the "Car of the brigade, and so will a great many others. Shaw Fleming Thompson civil politics are not of the quality that electors should seek to perpetuate.

Workers are aroused on election day, and if you have not been notified, get around and do your share in the division in which you live. Work! Work! Work!!! If you do you'll surely win.

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## BOARD OF EDUCATION

### To the Electors of the City of Toronto

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN—

In appearing before you as candidates for election to the Board of Education for the City of Toronto, we do so as the nominees of Organized Labor, believing that such body should have and are entitled by reason of their numbers to at least four members to look after their interests on such Board. Three of the candidates have been for a number of years members of the Technical School Board, viz.: Messrs. Henderson, Raynor and Tweed, the last named being the present Chairman of the Board. Their work has been satisfactory to their constituents, proof of which is in election year after year as their representative. Mr. Sinclair, at present Vice-President of the Toronto District Labor Council, is in every way capable by his executive ability to look after your interests on the Board of Education honestly and faithfully. A few people have the idea that only men with B.A., M.A. and other academic titles have the ability to conduct affairs pertaining to education, but we think that a fair amount of intelligence backed up by good, common sense can do more for the educational welfare of our children than all the theories propounded by the greatest philosophers, it is a business proposition and should be accepted as such. As witness the success of the Toronto Technical School, conducted on business principles; economy and proficiency being the ruling idea and it is the proud boast of that Board that it never overdraw its estimates. With such a record we can confidently appeal to the electors for their support. While we may be called class representatives, in a sense, seeking to look after the interests of Labor, bear this in mind that what benefits the poorer class the higher class can take advantage of, but the class legislation as advocated and adopted by the higher class is unfortunately of such a nature that it is out of the reach of men of moderate means and cannot be taken advantage of.

Labor never had a better opportunity to do something for its own betterment than the present, the principles which we advocate in our meetings you can put in force at the ballot box on the first of January next, we ask your confidence and support for the opportunity to put these principles into operation. If you believe in the maxim the greatest good to the greatest number, vote for us. We do not promise to turn the world upside down, but we do promise, if elected, to look after the interests of all the people, irrespective of race, creed or politics, honestly, economically and faithfully far as our ability will guide us.
