

BOODIES OF THIRTY MINERS RECOVERED

RELIEF CONTINUES IN TENNESSEE MINE

Five Men Imprisoned, Since Saturday Brought Out Alive by Rescuers

Priceville, Tenn., Dec. 12.—Spurred by last night's discovery of survivors of Saturday's disaster in the Cross Mountain mine, fresh squads went into the mine this morning, hacking and digging with redoubled energy. They only reward, however, was the discovery of a corpse-strewn chamber, far back in the mine. Six bodies were recovered. Two of the six were identified. One was Joseph McIntyre, the other was Val Vallade, who had a wife and four children.

Five men were brought alive from the Cross Mountain mine at 11 o'clock last night. These men had been prisoners since Saturday morning, when an explosion entombed more than 100 men. Three were found behind a barricade they had erected to protect themselves from noxious gases. Two more were found alive later. The rescued men: William Henderson, aged 55; William Henderson, aged 22, his son; John Smith, aged 15; Arthur Scott, aged 20; Doris Irish, aged 20. They are all married, and their wives had almost given up hope.

Additional signs of life were discovered in the Cross Mountain mine at 11 this morning. On the walls of the shaft were found inscribed these words: "We have gone to rest."

Immediately after the rescue squads reached their efforts to reach section No. 23. At first the inscription was believed to be a grim humor of one of the trapped miners, but a crudely drawn "X" hand" aimed at entry No. 23 pointed out the way.

The rescue party went into section No. 23 but no miners were found there, but additional directions for their rescue were found scrawled in chalk on the walls. They evidently were compelled to change their point of view on account of the altering currents. The rescue party followed the direction indicated by the chalk marks.

At 11 a.m. a total of 30 bodies had been removed.

INJUNCTION REFUSED

Vancouver, Dec. 12.—Mr. Justice Morrison yesterday dismissed the application made on behalf of Robert Kelly and associates to restrain the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company from carrying out the proposed auction sale of lots in South Hazelton.

Mr. Justice Morrison said he thought the matter too remote to grant an injunction on. "If I grant an injunction," he said, "I must take the view that the railroad will be benefited by any sales that the defendants may make previous to their selling. I cannot make any such assumption."

"The application is dismissed," said Mr. Alexander.

"Yes," replied the court. "His lordship stated that he would reserve the question of costs for the trial judge."

SEEKS CONCESSION FROM UNITED STATES

Another Country Asks for Same Treatment as is Accorded Canada

Washington, D. C., Dec. 12.—Austria-Hungary, in addition to a request for Norway and Sweden, has asked that her pulp and wood pulp be permitted under the most favored nation clause of her treaty with this country, to enter the United States free of duty under the same conditions that Canadian pulp and print paper are given free duty under the reciprocity law.

The question of granting this privilege to the foreign countries that have applied is to be decided soon by President Taft after he has a full report on the subject from the treasury and state departments.

KILLED BY RUNAWAY HORSE

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 12.—Mrs. Alice Gaetan Clarke, 65 years old, was killed by a runaway horse last night, and Miss Eliza Clarke, a daughter, was seriously injured. The two women were struck by the runaway while they were waiting for a street car, Thomas McDermott, aged 18, driver of the vehicle, was arrested and charged with manslaughter.

MINER KILLED

Phoenix, Dec. 11.—Tom Williams, a miner, was instantly killed by an explosion in the Emma mine at Oro Blanco. The information at hand is somewhat meagre, but it is supposed that while engaged in building a large boiler he drilled into a missed hole. The deceased had only worked at the Emma mine about three weeks as a widower and large family.

TRAIN FALLS INTO RIVER

Groote, Portugal, Dec. 12.—Sixteen persons were killed and several injured last night in the derailment of a train, which fell into the Douro river.

CITIZENS DO NOT GET FAIR VALUE

COST OF LIGHT IS HIGHLY EXCESSIVE

Board of Trade Council Considers Report on Price Here Compared With Other Cities

That the citizens of Victoria do not get value for the high price they pay for gas and electric lighting was the view of the members of the board of trade, in discussing on Tuesday a report of a special committee appointed some time ago to ascertain the facts as to the prices paid here as compared with other cities, and the cost of generation and transmission. This report, as will be seen, gives some very suggestive figures, and it called forth from the gentlemen present at the meeting under the chairmanship of H. G. Wilson some very emphatic expressions of opinion.

The report of the special committee, of which J. W. Ambrey was chairman, was as follows:

Gentlemen:—Acting on your instructions in June last, to obtain information as to the rates charged in other cities for electric power and lighting and for gas, a question sheet, as per accompanying copy, was prepared and sent to Toronto, Hamilton, Seattle, Calgary, Winnipeg, Edmonton, Spokane, London and Vancouver, and the accompanying particulars have been received.

Attention may be called to the Dominion Act of Parliament which provides for reports upon the illuminating power and purity of gas. There is also an Electric Inspection Act. The published particulars of inspection furnish very little information as to whether or not the gas and electric light meet the requirements contemplated in the acts.

The citizens of Victoria are paying sufficient to ensure the highest efficiency of both gas and electricity and it is recommended that the local inspector be so notified and asked to furnish this Board of Trade with particulars of the result of his inspection whenever made.

Appended to the report were tables showing the cost of light and power in several cities. The first shows the power used in the generation of electricity, distance of plant from the city, and charges for light and power per kilowatt hour, as follows:

Toronto.—Hydraulic: 32 miles; light, 3c. to 3c. with discount of 10 per cent; gas, 5c. to 5c. with discount of 10 to 20 per cent.

Hamilton.—Hydraulic: 32 miles; light, 2 1/2c.; discount 10 per cent; installation fee, power, \$1.20 per h.p. per month.

Seattle.—Steam and hydraulic: 25 and 45 miles; coal at \$3 a ton; light, 3 1/2c. to 4 1/2c.; power, 7c. to 8c.

Calgary.—Steam and hydraulic: 35 miles; light, 9c. discount of 15 per cent; power, 2c. to 1 1/2-10, with discount of 10 per cent.

Winnipeg.—Hydraulic: 37 miles; light, 7 1/2c., now 8c.; power, 4c. to 1c.

Edmonton.—Steam: 30 miles; light, 8c.; power, 8c. to 3 1/2c.

London.—Steam and hydraulic: 150 miles; coal at \$3 a ton; light, 4 1/2c.; power, 3 1/2c. to 1 1/2c., with discount of 10 and 10 per cent.

Vancouver.—Steam and hydraulic: 17 miles; light, 11c. to 4c., with discount of 20 per cent; power, minimum charge of 2c.

Victoria.—Steam and hydraulic: 13c. to 9c., with discount of 10 per cent; power, 7c. to 2c.

The cost of gas in various cities is as follows:

Hamilton.—Coal, \$3 per ton; gas, \$1 per 1,000.

Seattle.—Coal, \$2.90; gas, \$1.25 per 1,000; discount 10 and 20 per cent.

Calgary.—Coal, \$2.82 1/2; gas, \$1.25 per 1,000.

Winnipeg.—Coal, \$3.50 per ton; gas, \$1.30 per 1,000, discount 10 and 25 per cent.

Spokane.—Coal, \$4.50 per ton; gas, \$1.50 per 1,000.

London.—Coal, \$3 per ton; gas, \$1.50 per 1,000.

Vancouver.—Coal, \$3.75 per ton; gas, \$1.50 per 1,000, discount 10 per cent.

Victoria.—Coal, \$3.75 per ton; gas, \$1.50 per 1,000, (b) \$2 to \$1.50, discount 10 per cent.

Mr. Ambrey stated that the inspection provided for in the Dominion law for efficiency and illuminating power were not now being made, it being explained that in consequence of the very general use of mantles it was not considered necessary to have such inspection. He stated that the inspection of electric light he referred to the very uncertain power supplied and the effect of this on mantles. The act, he said, prescribed a current of 110 volts with a variation of not more than two volts either way. Judging from the erratic manner in which lights acted in Victoria, this margin was widely exceeded, and now that consumers were largely using Tungsten lamps, which were very delicate, and had to be paid for by them, it was more than ever necessary that there should be a constant current to prevent their untimely wearing out.

The members of the council were not satisfied with the official explanation that the inspection of electric light was not necessary, now that mantles were so largely used, it being maintained that the question of efficiency, even as largely increased consumption as formerly, as many people did not use mantles for light and for heating purposes there was a large consumption. The report was adopted and Mr. Ambrey was thanked for the same, to which he had gone in his presentation. It will come up for discussion later at a general meeting of the board.

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 12.—Mrs. David Caplan, wife of the alleged anarchist dynamiter sought in connection with the Los Angeles dynamiting cases, cannot be found guilty by Deputy United States marshal, who has a subpoena for her to testify before the grand jury at Los Angeles. The last trace had of Mrs. Caplan was when, in company with Anton Johannsen, organizer of the state building trades, she dropped up to the Metropolitan Bank building here about four months ago.

No further information concerning the whereabouts of Johannsen and Olen Twitmore, another executive officer of the state building trades, has been discovered to-day by the subpoena servers. Twitmore at last reported had left the Victoria hotel in New York and was said to be following Johannsen to San Francisco.

The marshals office here will have completed its work with the summoning of Mrs. Caplan, Twitmore and Johannsen. Mrs. Caplan's testimony is most required by the authorities. It was at the Caplan house that the marshals, Caplan and "Schmidt" had numerous conferences prior to the blowing up of the Times.

McNamara in Penitentiary.

San Quentin, Cal., Dec. 12.—Gray units among the stripe-clad prisoners in San Quentin prison, no longer the majority, are being subjected to the same treatment as the "McNamara" prisoners. The brothers took up the routine of prison life yesterday, joining the long serpentine line of prisoners.

Denounce McNamara.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 12.—Resolutions denouncing the McNamara brothers, but defending the course of organized labor in providing for the defense of the accused men, who they believed to be innocent, have been adopted by the central labor union of Washington. The resolutions also condemned the "kidnapping" of the McNamaras.

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SOUTHERN COLORADO MINERS MAY STRIKE

Men Are Dissatisfied With Condition Under Which They Work

Denver, Col., Dec. 12.—According to President Smith of the United Mine Workers of America, district No. 16, and other officials, a strike of 10,000 coal miners in the Southern Colorado fields is imminent because of dissatisfaction of the men over the conditions under which they work. The Southern Colorado fields are operated chiefly by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company and the Viceroy Coal Company.

"The strike has been imminent for several months," said President Smith today, "and while we are doing all we can to prevent it, I must say that the indications for our preventing it are very poor."
