The terms of the contract are practically the same as those required of the contractors who did the clearing last winter, with a few exceptions. The timber is to be cut close, grubbed, and all refuse burned; but in several places the best trees are to be left standing for park purposes, while the large trees cut down, suitable for logs, will be trimmed and left on the ground, in stead of being sawed into six-foot lengths and burnt with the refuse, as was done on previous clearing.

Messrs, Irwin, Johnston & Campbell are now busy erecting their camps on the new ground, and making ready to men which they will employ. Before tenders for clearing were called for last October, the Grand Trunk Pacific had an average acre of timbered land cleared here by day work to determine the cost, and this labor amounted to \$150. When tenders were called for, the figures ran from \$120 to \$175 per acre, so the former amount was the ruling price and contracts let accordingly. All the contractors did their work well and paid their men 35 cents to 40 cents per hour, and made money.
