ARRANGEMENTS FOR NEW NAVY

AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT REPORTS TO PARLIAMENT

Same Military Terms to Be Used by All Parts of Empire.

The report of the proceedings of the Defence conference as they affected Australia was presented to the Australian parliament shortly before the steamer Aorangi left for this port. According to that report Australia is to provide a fleet unit of one armoured and three unarmoured cruisers, six destroyers, and three submarines. The vessels are to be manned, as far as possible, by Australians, The rest of the complement is to be made up of Royal Navy officers and men.

In peace time, and while on the Aus tralian station, the unit will be under the exclusive control of the Common wealth government as regards movements and general administration; but regulations similar to the King's reguons and naval discipline shall obations and naval disciplinations and naval d the Royal Navy. The senior officer shall mand the whole, and when placed at the disposal of the admiralty the vessels are to be controlled by the Navai Commander-in-Chief. The Austra-Han unit is to be part of the Eastern of the Empire, composed of the East Indies, China and Australian

The initial cost is estimated as follows:-One armoured cruiser (new Indomitable class,) £2,000,000; three unar ured cruisers (Bristols,) at £350,000; £1.050,000; six destroyers (River class) at £80,000, £480,000; three submarines (class) at £55,000, £165,000. Total, £3,695,-
