Joe Martin Came Near Being Removed From

(From a member of the Sun staff.) Ottawa, June 6 .- In the commons this afternoon the penitentiary bill got a second reading and went through committee. This act provides that convicts who become insane may be sent to provincial asylums and re-stored to penitentiaries when they recover.

A resolution to allow the chief pus tice of British Columbia one thousand instead of six hundred dollars as judge in admiralty was then taken up. was opposed by Mr. Laurier and oth-ers, but passed by consent with the understanding that the contest could be resumed when the bill was intro duced.
