## Victims of the Plague—Five and a Quarter Millions Have Died of it in About Ten Years.

The main feature of Mr. Morley's speech were the following:--Further reduction of the salt tax. Surplus of three-quarters of a mil-lion in the Indian Budget. Military expenditure in India to be reduced by half a million. No Gov-ernment interference with the Indian military programme. An advisory council of Indian not-

Continuance of safeguards against "anarchy and bloody chaos." Announcement of the plague figures: In 1900 there were 92,000 deaths; in 1904, 1,400,000; and the deaths exceed-ed 1,000,000 in 1905. The plague first appeared in 1896, and between then and April of the present year the num-ber of death was 5,250,000. No public trials for the sedition workers. "A public trial would ad-vertise these creatures far and wide, and make martyrs of them." The finance itself did not bulk over largely in the statement.
