INDIA TO BE RULED WITH IRON HAND
Hon. John Morley's Way of Dealing With Recent Disturbances.
Victims of the Plague—Five and a Quarter Millions Have Died of It in About Ten Years.

Their meet in India gave exceptional interest to the Indian Budget day in the British Commons recently, and Mr. Morley had no occasion for the excuse he offered that he only troubled the House once a year, just as the also favored once in a hundred years. The main feature of Mr. Morley's speech was the following:
Further reduction of the salt tax. Surplus of three-quarters of a million in the Indian Budget.
Military expenditure in India to be reduced by half and between the Indian government with the Indian military programme.
An advisory council of Indian notables to be established, and the Legislative Council to be substantially enlarged, to enable the native Indian voice to be more freely heard.
Continuance of safeguards against "anarchy and bloody chaos."
Announcement of the plague figures: In 1906 there were 22,000 deaths; in 1904, 1,400,000; and the deaths exceeded 1,000,000 in 1905. The plague first appeared in 1896, and between then and April of the present year the number of deaths was 5,250,000.
No public trials for the sedition workers. "A public trial would advertise these creatures far and wide, and make martyrs of them."
The finance (which did not bulk over the "statement" on the opium question, certain hon. members had implied him to put righteousness before revenue. But he did not believe in satisfying one's own righteousness at the expense of other people's revenue.

REPLY TO RADICALS.
As to the disorders, he was more anxious to be heard by members on his own side. That was the first occasion on which what was called British democracy in its full strength was brought directly face to face with the Indian government with all its difficulties. One of the most difficult experiments ever tried in human history was whether you would carry on (which he, for himself, thought they would have to carry on in India) personal government along with free speech and the free right of public meeting. He wished to take the House into his confidence, but desired it to realize that what was said there would be heard and overheard thousands of miles away, not least by those whom he reluctantly called his enemies.
Although Lord Minto had declined to be frightened by any foolish charge of pandering to agitation in refusing assent to the Colonization Act, he did not think that resistance to that act was the main cause of the disturbances. A prosecution would have advertised this matter far and wide. Suppose a single native regiment broke out and sided with the rioters there might have been disastrous results. It would have been absurd, at the risk of a conflagration, not to use the powers which were already to their hand, and he offered no apology for what he had done.

DO INDIANS LIKE BRITISH?
It was urged that Great Britain's administration would be more popular if it were a trifle less efficient, a trifle more elastic. He was confident that most of the population of India were on our side. He did not say they liked us. That did not matter. But they knew their whole interests were bound up in the law and order we preserved. Much might be gained if we had a commission to inquire on the spot into the great mischief of overcentralization.
Coming now to the practical steps which had been taken, Mr. Morley announced that the Government had given approval to the establishment of an advisory council of notables to be called together from time to time for the double purpose of eliciting independent opinion and of securing that correct information should be obtained of the Government's intentions. Approval had also been given to the general principle of the substantial enlargement of the legislative councils.
The Secretary of State had the privilege of nominating members of the Council of India, and the time had now come when he might safely, wisely, and justly nominate one or two Indian members, for he was oppressed by the thought of how few opportunities the Government had of hearing the voice of India.
In his peroration Mr. Morley said: "There is a school who say we might wisely walk out of India, leaving India to manage her own affairs better than we can. Anybody who pictures to himself the anarchy, the bloody chaos, which would follow any such withdrawal will shrink from any such position. We, at all events, are bound to take a completely different view. I believe that certainly the Government, and this House in all its parties and groups will determine that we shall face all these mischiefs, difficulties, and dangers with a clear conscience—for we know we are doing it for our own interests, but the interests of these millions committed to us—with sympathy, kindness, firmness and a love of justice, and whether the way be fair or foul, with courage and a hopeful spirit."

PORTUGAL'S THRONE IN PERIL
People, Republican, Need Only a Leader—Serious Complications.

LONDON, June 26.—A correspondent of the Tribune in a letter mailed at Lisbon on June 19 says that King Carlos's throne is in imminent danger of being swept away by the risk of a great democratic wave, swollen almost to dangerous proportions by the general act of Caesarism which he permitted on May 1. He goes on: "Premier Franco's decree was unconstitutional and ill advised, he at any rate backed it up with promises and cunning reasons, but the people do not forget that last year the King condemned Ribeiro's attempt to dissolve the Cortes, and they contrast this attitude toward a Conservative Premier with the curiously illogical license he has given to Senior Franco."
"The general feeling of the country is one of advanced liberalism with the strongest republican inclinations, and a repudiation of the autocratic bungling which lost Dom Miguel the throne in 1834 can only have one result in Portugal today, namely, the deposition of the King and the establishment of a republic."
"That the monarchy must fall tomorrow or the day after is in the nation's contract with the future, but the manner of its falling is not pleasant to contemplate."
"It must be remembered that a crown is a difficult thing to yield up, and that the King of Portugal, Carl of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, is of an unbending race, which has powerful princes in its kinship, that his Queen is a Bourbon and a Princess of Prussia, and that Rome can ill afford to lose a most faithful ally."
"We have already heard of the possibility of a British fleet patrolling Portuguese waters and of a Spanish army inspecting the frontier. We know that Portugal should have made a part in the new enterprise, and history tells us that kings have a way of holding kings."
"There stands in indignant opposition a people insulted in their rights. So far they have no leader, but there may be a Marcellin Albert in their ranks in the country. In such crisis Latin and Oporto will call him to their ears and when they are listening the whole world may have to give attention to him."

SOME TREMENDOUS FIGURES.

"Moody's Manual" Shows \$38,248,688,000 Capital in Corporations.
NEW YORK, June 26.—The 1907 edition of "Moody's Manual," just issued, shows for steam railroads, public utilities, industrial and mining no less than \$38,248,688,000 of capitalization represented, of which over 92 per cent. more than \$35,000,000,000, is embraced within the borders of the United States. This total capitalization is remarkable, particularly in view of the statistics recently furnished by the Census Bureau at Washington, which gave an approximate estimate of something like \$20,000,000,000 as the property represented by corporation securities in this country.

COLLEGE WEDLOCK STATISTICS

Striking Results Shown by Tables Compiled at Yale.

NEW HAVEN, June 26.—There has been compiled for the Yale Alumni Weekly by R. M. Byrnes of the class of 1905 and R. D. Bennett of the class of 1906 an exhaustive and significant set of tables bearing upon vital statistics and occupations of Yale graduates. The basis of the compilation is a group of 20 Yale classes—1867-1886. In the period of 20 years after graduation, 1,891 graduates show that 35 per cent. have entered law as an occupation, 12 per cent. teaching, nine per cent. medicine, seven per cent. manufacturing, eight per cent. mercantile life, six per cent. the ministry, and 21 per cent. miscellaneous occupations. About 70 per cent. entered the professions—a class that would be much reduced in later years. In law at the end of the 20 years, 57 per cent. had married; in teaching, 70 per cent.; in medicine, 59 per cent.; in manufacturing, 64 per cent.; in mercantile life, 52 per cent.; in the ministry, 70 per cent.; and in miscellaneous occupations, 62 per cent. In the whole 1,891 graduates, 64 per cent. had married.
The doctors married at an average age of 31.1 years; lawyers at 30.3 years; teachers at 29.7 years; clergymen, 29.1 years; merchants at 29 years; and those in miscellaneous occupations 29.5 years. The average fecundity of marriage was 2.2 children; figures for the clergy being 2.3, for lawyers, teachers and manufacturers 2 children each, doctors and merchants, 1.7 children, and for those in miscellaneous occupations 1.9 children. Allowing for net deaths of children later in life, it is obvious that college wedlock does not add to the census returns. But statistics of 629 families from which graduates of the last three classes came show that the families of the next earlier generation contained an average of 3.66 children each, suggesting strikingly, when compared with the 2.2 children average of the graduates, the relative sterility of college marriages.
The returns of the 1,901 graduates summarized indicate that Yale graduates marry two years later than the average age of marriage in Massachusetts; that about 64 per cent. marry, as compared with about 75 per cent. of the professional classes in England, where, however, the professional class marry somewhat later; that there are more college bachelors than in the general community; that the merchants, though they marry earlier, have fewest children, while clergymen have the most; and that the fecundity of college marriages appears to be steadily decreasing.
