England has been visited by Japanese, Germans, French, and Russian warships, and all have been made wel-

ese, Germans, French, and Russian warships, and all have been made welcome, but none have experienced anything like the greeting that would be accorded to the battleships of the United States and their plucky commander who is already a popular character in the eyes of the British. In May the entire French Channel squadron will pay a visit to Dover as a guard of honor to President Fallieres who is coming to London to open the great Franco-British Exhibition, and the rumor has gained ground that the American fleet are likely to materialize about the same time. If this is true the enthusiasm of the welcome will be beyond bounds for the English have the greatest admiration for the spick and span alertness of the American sailor and there will be hospitable to a visitor, especially if that visitor comes as a son of the sea, no race in the world can equal him the enthusiasm of the sincerty of his greeting nor in his self effacement in his endeavors to make his visitor thoroughly at home.
