AMERICAN FOOTBALL CHANGED

New York, Feb. 3.—The football rules committee which has been working in secret here for two days upon innumerable suggestions for altering the season tonight, for the McGill University seven, of Montreal. The score was 3 to 0. Harvard's forwards outskated and outmanoeuvred McGill and the crimson backs checked all advances. Capt. Huntington, of Harvard was the bright star of the night. He scored two of Harvard's three goals, Blackall caging the puck the other time.

The lines of its anticipated improvement are in substance as follows: 1.—The playing field, now 110 yards in length, will be shortened to an even 100 yards. 2.—An area of ten yards wide beyond the goal lines is set apart and in this the attacking team will be allowed to use the forward pass. 3.—The number of "downs" to gain ten yards is increased by one. 4.—The on-side kick is entirely eliminated. 5.—The value of a touchdown is increased from five points to 6 points, the goal touchdown and other scores standing at present. 6.—The twenty yards zone in which the present rules now provided restrictions to interference with the forward pass is eliminated so that the restrictions will apply now to any part of the field. 7.—In case of a touch back the ball will be put in play from the twenty-yard line instead of the twenty-five yard line. 8.—On a kick-off the ball, instead of being put in play in the centre of the field will be put in play from the forty yard line of the team kicking off. 9.—The field judge is eliminated. The headlines man will hereafter keep time and be judge of off-side plays in the line of scrimmage. 10.—The number of men allowed on the side lines, now three, will be reduced to one for each team. 11.—A provision will be made to the effect that a bounding ball cannot score a legitimate goal. 12.—The resting interval between the first and second and the third and fourth periods is reduced from two minutes to one minute.
