With such men as Dell of Brooklyn and Dale of Cincinnati, both discarded by the St. Louis Cardinals, winning regularly now in the National League there is another good argument that the hitting has fallen off.

Hitting is Responsible Only nine men are hitting above .300 in the National League at present.

Braves Are Threatening. During the last two weeks the Braves have made the best advance on the other teams of any time during the race.

In considering the close race of the league critics have advanced many theories. Some assert that the hitting has fallen off until it is almost negligible, while others insist that the league has more good pitchers than ever before.

In the American League outfielders still predominate among the heavy hitters, six of the first ten being gardeners.
