

Fredericton. March 14.—The enquiry which Coroner G. A. Perley has been carrying on into the mysterious death of Edward Sacoble, the Oromocto Indian, has failed to reveal any evidence to indicate that foul play was the cause of death. "Without a shadow of doubt he was drowned, declared Coroner Perley in discussing the case tonight. Dr. Plummer, of Oromocto, has just concluded his postmortem examination of the body. It showed the stomach and lungs to be full of water and gave every evidence that the contusion over the dead man's eye had not been caused by a fatal blow.

Coroner Perley's jury viewed the body after it was taken from the waters of Swann Creek and then adjourned to meet on Tuesday at the Burton Court House. Frank Nash, the Indian, who had a quarrel with Sacoble over the election of a chief and struck him a blow with his fist, last Tuesday night, is to come up for examination before Magistrate Hoben at Gagetown on the same date.
