
CAPT. FOREN SUSPENDED.
Capt. Levi Foren is suspended for three months and his license is withheld for that time by the decision of the United States inspectors who gave him a hearing today on the charge of unskillfulness. He was in command of the steamer Bay State, which went ashore the night of Sept. 23 on McKenney's Point, Cape Elizabeth, and is being dismantled where she struck.

An investigation by Inspectors Harry L. Thompson and Walter L. Blaisdell resulted in a charge of unskillfulness, now sustained and carrying suspension as the penalty. Witnesses examined included Capt. Foren, his pilot, U. S. Gilpatrick, of Boston, and the bow watch, Galen F. Seavey. He was represented by counsel and the hearing lasted two hours.

A DERELICT SCHOONER.
The derelict schooner Fanny C. Bowen, which was abandoned several weeks since, her master, Capt. Carter, of Yarmouth, Me., having been lost at the time, is still afloat in southern waters, a grave menace to navigation. She was again passed on Oct. 28, in latitude 35 north and longitude 53.21 west, with stump of foremast and mainmast still standing.
