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OLEOMARGARINE USED IN PLACE OF BUTTER

Ottawa Free Press Declares Quantities of it are being Brought into Capital and Sold at 22 Cents.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Free Press declares tonight that oleomargarine is being brought into the city and selling at 22 cents a pound, although it is not coming through the grocers, dairy dealers or meat markets. Margarine is prohibited entry into or manufacture in Canada.

"The substitute is being brought in by men who are not 'business,' says the Free Press. 'It started with their bringing it in for themselves, and gradually spread through their friends to their friends, and to their friends, until it must have become quite a profitable business.'

"The sale is among people who could not possibly afford to pay fifty cents for butter and the motive was truly altruistic to start with. It is still a friendly enterprise, carefully covered by secrecy, but a great number of people are profiting."

CERTIFIED COPY OF A REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE PRIVY COUNCIL, APPROVED BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF THE 24TH NOVEMBER, 1916. 652-17-22

The Committee of the Privy Council have before them a report, dated 9th November, 1916, from the Minister of Militia and Defense, representing that many soldiers of the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force are absent from their units without leave. It is probable that the larger number of them did not, when leaving, appreciate the seriousness of their offense, and that they are now desirous of coming back, but, fearing severe punishment hesitate to do so.

Further, soldiers of the Overseas Force now undergoing imprisonment for "desertion" or "absence without leave" are available for service with the Force, if pardoned and released from imprisonment.

The Minister therefore recommends that Your Excellency, as an act of grace on assuming the Government of the Dominion, be pleased to grant the Royal Clemency to such persons by issuing a Proclamation to the effect that those soldiers of the Expeditionary Force who are now absent without leave be pardoned for such offense, provided they surrender themselves to the Officer Commanding the unit to which they belonged, where that unit is still in Canada, or if it be not to the District Officer Commanding any Military District in Canada not later than the 15th day of December, 1916, for the purpose of completing their engagements, and that those soldiers of the said Force who are now under sentence of imprisonment or detention for desertion or absence without leave be pardoned for such offense, be released from imprisonment or detention, and be handed over to the Officer Commanding the Military District in which they are, for the purpose of being returned to some other units of the Expeditionary Force in order to complete their engagements.

The Committee concur in the foregoing recommendation and submit the same for approval.

TORONTO MANUFACTURER LEAVES LARGE ESTATE

Head of Gurney Foundry, Company Worth Nearly a Million Dollars at Death—Terms of Will.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—The will of the late Edward Gurney, foundry man of Toronto, is inventoried at \$1,930,832, of which \$629,650 is stock in his several enterprises, the Gurney Foundry Company, Toronto; the Gurney Heater Company, Boston, and the foundry at Winnipeg, and \$95,048 is life insurance. His widow receives the family residence and \$20,000 per annum for life, and until 1925 each of his five children receives \$3,000 a year. After January 1, 1923, the bulk of the estate is to be divided equally among the five children, subject to the continuance of the widow's annuity, if she be still living.
