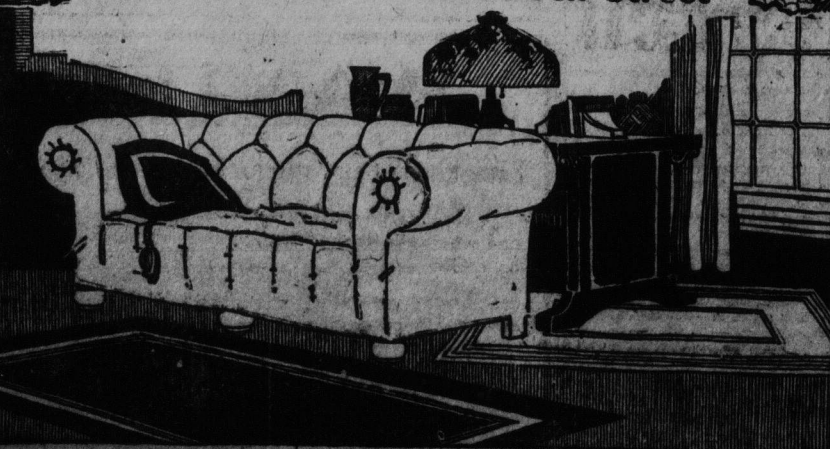

## HELD CONFERENCE WITH HON. CALDER

Provincial Government Members Yesterday Discussed With Minister Matters Concerning Settling of Soldiers on the Land.

Yesterday afternoon the members of the provincial government and Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of colonization and immigration, held a conference in the government rooms here on matters concerning the settling of soldiers on the land. Mr. Calder has been visiting all the provinces and consulting with the provincial governments in order to talk over with them the proposed legislation and to secure their co-operation. The Dominion government will pass general legislation covering the subject and the provincial governments will have to work out the details according to their local requirements. The minister of Mr. Calder has been to have the legislation both of the Dominion and the provinces in harmony and to this end he has visited the different provinces and consulted with the leaders.

In the West this had been done before the conference of provincial premiers at Ottawa, and he is now visiting the eastern portion of the Dominion. Thursday he spent at Halifax with Premier Murray, and today he will be at Quebec to meet Premier Gouin.

After the conference both Premier Foster and Mr. Calder expressed themselves as pleased with the outlook and satisfied that this problem would be handled in the best way for the province and for the men.

Newcastle, Dec. 13.—The death of Luke Goodfellow, son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Goodfellow, South East, occurred yesterday after a short illness of pneumonia. Deceased was nineteen years of age, and besides his parents is survived by the following brothers and sisters: William, David and Alfred, at home; Mrs. Herman McKay, Strathadam; Agnes and Alice, at home.

**Pte. William Thompson Wren.**  
On December 7th Christopher Wren of St. George, N. B., received an official notice from Adjutant General H. Harrison, Washington, D. C., U. S. A., stating that his son, Pte. William Thompson Wren, Company A, 28 U. S. Infantry, American Expeditionary Forces, France, was killed in action September 28th.

A letter received by Mr. Wren, written on November 30th, and signed by the chaplain, 1st Lieutenant of the regiment to which his son belonged, 39th, stated that during the great American drive the 39th was sent forward to take and hold a very difficult position from the enemy. The regiment did take and hold the position, but among the fallen was his son, who lost his life. He had fought heroically and comrades had fought heroically and had made the supreme sacrifice in the cause of the freedom and liberty and peace of the world.

**Harold Chase.**  
Jemseg, Dec. 11.—After only a short illness Harold Chase, only 18 years of age, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carlmas Chase, of Lower Cambridge, N. B., succumbed to a severe attack of pneumonia. 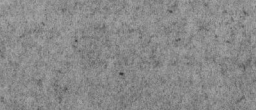

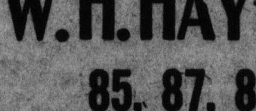
