Chicago, Jan. 24.—The old, old song,

too much music in the air, according
to J. R. Schmidt, radio inspector.

Thousands of persons who obtain
their music by the radio route have
complained, Mr. Schmidt said, that
the ether is flooded with electrical
cantatas, intermezzi, concertos and
orchestra numbers, not to mention
speeches, lectures and messages sent
out by amateurs.

According to Mr. Schmidt, amateurs
are required to tune their instruments
to 300-meter wave lengths. Many are
not doing so and as a result virtually
all owners of radio phones are receiving
the waves. There are more than
24,000 amateurs in the country, Mr.
Schmidt said.

The amateur skating championships
held at Plattsburg, N. Y., finished yester-
day and every heat, semi-final,
grand semi-final and final, proved
hard fought contests among the fast-
est skaters in North America. The
United States skaters won the most
points, but it must be remembered
that Charles Gorman of St. John was
a great skater against such
worthy competitors. He was placed
in every heat, either first or second,
and in every semi-final and final, with
the exception of one, during the three
days racing. When it is considered
that Gorman figures in the points
for seniors, and made such a good
showing, St. John fans have every
reason to feel proud of such a skater
to represent this city of cham-
pions. The pick of the United States
skaters took part in the final,
and while a large number of fans
skaters never got a chance in heats,
senior or final, Charles Gorman was
right up with the leaders.

In the junior events Willie Logan
and Irving Leonard also helped to
keep St. John on the map, for these
youngsters, like Gorman, also figured
in the points and did remarkably
well, in fact St. John holds premier
honors for all Canada.

Gorman won 20 points, Logan and
Leonard 10 each, while the only other
Canadians to figure were Fred Des-
jardis with 40, Bloomfield with 20,
and Smith with 10 each, and it is
at the time made in the different races
in which the St. John boys skate,

pionship races to be held. While
St. John's boys did not get placed
in any final he was right up with the
best of them in the heats.

The St. John skaters leave for

Londoners Have Kearns Thinking

Offer Dempsey Purse Equal
to One Received Last Sum-
mer to Fight Carpenter in
London Next July.

New York, Jan. 26.—A purse "equal
to the one he received for the Jersey
City fight last summer" has been of-
fered Jack Dempsey for a second
bout with George Carpenter in Lon-
don in July, Jack Kearns, the cham-
pion's manager, announced tonight.

Dempsey's share in the champion-
ship fight with the Frenchman on
July 2 was said to have been \$200,000,
the largest stake ever offered a
pugilist. Carpenter's share was \$200,
000.

"This offer, of course, is more than
tempting," said Kearns, "and I will
announce my decision soon."

The London offer was made by a
syndicate of sportsmen, Kearns said.
He came on the heels of a message
from William A. Brady expressing his
desire to match Dempsey and Harry
Wills, in London.

In recent talk in the sporting world

ter in the world's championship.

Danzig Is Becoming Internationalized

Poles and Danzigers Fail to
Live in Harmony.

Danzig, Jan. 26.—This old German
port on the Baltic, created a free city
by the Treaty of Versailles in order
to give the Poles access to the sea, is
becoming internationalized and a cen-
ter of conflicting interests.

One of Danzig's largest stores adver-
tises that nine languages are spoken
by its clerks and the colors of England,
France, Poland, Italy, Sweden, Lithu-
ania, Spain, Norway and Denmark
greet visitors at the main entrance.

It is seldom that the Poles and Dan-
zigers agree on anything and on this
account the League of Nations has a
high commissioner, General Haking, an
English army officer on the ground to
settle disputes when possible. The
Danzigers continually are trying to
give them the worst of it.

General Haking says relations be-
tween the two are really improving
and that in the long run the Poles will
have all that is due them by inter-
national agreement, that the business and
life of some 300,000 Danzigers will go
on about as usual, and that Danzig will
prosper in future as a free city just as
the framers of the Treaty of Versailles
intended.

But the great changes in the life of
Danzig during the last year and a half
has not been without resentment. Re-
cently the Danzigers have been openly
opposing the influx of the Poles on the
pretention that unless restrictions are
enforced, Polish workmen will soon

been given the city by introduction of
cabarets, art at Zoppot, a suburb, gam-
bling and the influx of the sea have become quite
famous throughout Central Europe.
