BECKER PAYS THE PENALTY. Sing Sing Prison, Ossining, N. Y., July 30—Charles Becker, was put to death in the electric chair here this morning for the killing of Herman Rosenthal, a New York gambler. The former New York police lieutenant retained his composure and protested his innocence to the last. He went to his death with a photograph of his wife pinned on his shirt, over his heart. Three shocks were given before the prison physicians pronounced Becker dead, at 8.50 o'clock.

F. M. McDONALD, OF 6TH RIFLES, PROBABLY KILLED

London, Aug. 1—(Montreal Gazette Cable)—An inquest was held on Saturday on the body of Private Frederick Malcolm Douglas, aged 20 years, of Kingston (N.B.) Douglas was a member of the 6th Mounted Rifles, and was killed by lightning the day after his arrival from Canada.

Privates James Westwater and Charles Johnson, of the same battalion, had a narrow escape, both being slightly injured. An inquest was also held in the case of Private Joseph Victor Harvey, aged 24, of Murray Bay, and a member of the 22nd battalion. He was found shot in his hut, with his rifle at his side. Verdicts of accidental death were returned in both cases.

A telephone message from Kingston last night was that no one of the name given in the cablegram was known to have enlisted there in either the Mounted Rifles or any other unit. None of the published lists of men in the 6th Mounted Rifles contain the name of Frederick Malcolm Douglas.

Saturday's cables gave the name of the dead man as McDonald, and as there is a F. M. McDonald in the ranks of "B" squadron, it may be possible that the foregoing should read "Frederick Malcolm McDonald."
