father, and had made a couple of voyages to this country, but was desirous of remaining ashore, was sent to Miss McPherson's Home, in Knowlton, and when last heard of was doing well. A great many very deserving cases have been relieved : others have been refused, as they evidently belonged to the class of *Tramps*, and were travelling over the country at the expense of the various national and other societies. This latter class are not anxious for work, even when it is to be had.

Many interesting details are to be found in the minutebook, which is open to all members.
