It is not commonly known that the British & Foreign Bible Society has 50 printing houses, using 60 different forms of type, and produces 8 to 9 million copies annually in 558 languages. It supplies 40 missionaries at two-fifths the cost of production. The B. & F. Society supplies the Anglican Church with 190 languages, the Presbyterian with 136, the Methodist with 104 and the Baptist with 68, and keeps 1,000 colporteurs in foreign lands. Daniel C. 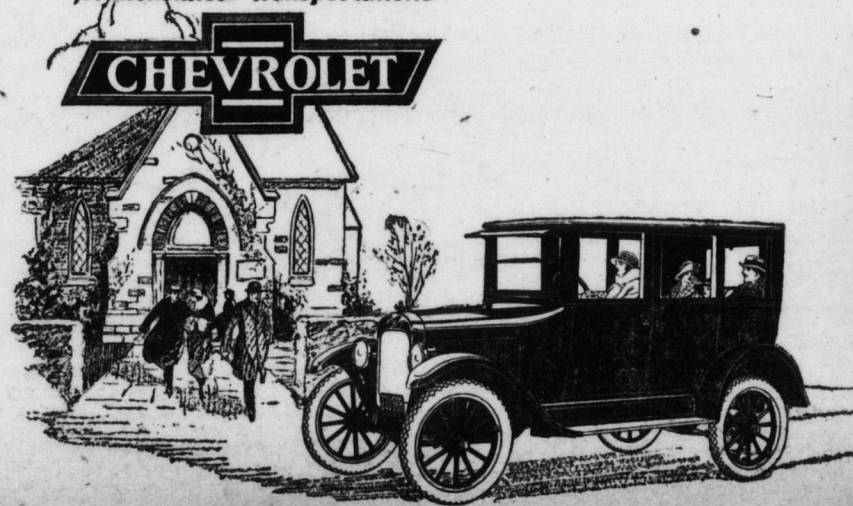
