## THE SOCIETY OF NATIONS COVENANT AS SUBMITTED

### Geneva Named as Seat of World League.

Specifically Stated That Monroe Doctrine and Similar Engagements Shall Not Be Affected, and That Mandatories Shall Go to Nations Only who Are Willing to Accept Such Women Eligible to Places in League.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The state department made public tonight the text of the revised covenant of the league of nations as it will be presented to-morrow to the plenary session of the peace conference at Paris. The text follows, with parenthetical insertions, showing changes made in the covenant as originally drafted and made public: THE COVENANT OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

"In order to promote international co-operation and to achieve international peace and security, by the acceptance of obligations not to resort to war, by the prescription of open, just and honorable relations between nations, by the firm establishment of the understandings of international law as to actual rule of conduct among governments, and by the maintenance of justice and a scrupulous regard for all treaty obligations in the dealings of organized peoples with another, the high contracting parties agree to this covenant of the league of nations.

(In the original preamble the last sentence read, "adopt this constitution" instead of "agree to this covenant".)

Article One.

"The original members of the league of nations shall be those of the signatories which are named in the annex to this covenant and also such of those other states named in the annex as shall accede without reservation to this covenant. Such accessions shall be effected by a declaration deposited

with the secretariat within two months of the coming into force of the covenant. Notice thereof shall be sent to all other members of the league.

"Any fully self-governing state, dominion or colony not named in the annex may become a member of the league if its admission is agreed by two-thirds of the assembly, provided that it shall give effective guarantee of its sincere intention to observe its international obligations and shall accept such regulations as may be prescribed by the league in regard to its military and naval forces and armaments.

"Any member of the league may, after two years' notice of its intention so to do, withdraw from the league, provided that all its international obligations and all its obligations under this covenant shall have been fulfilled at the time of its withdrawal.

(This article is now, embodying the alterations and additions of the old article seven. It provides more specifically the method of admitting new members and adds the entirely new paragraph providing for withdrawal from the league. No mention of withdrawal was made in the original document.)

Article Two.

"The action of the league under this covenant shall be effected through the instrumentality of an assembly and of a council with a permanent secretariat.

(Originally this was a part of article one. It gives the name assembly to the gathering of representatives of the members of the league, formerly referred to merely as "the body of delegates.")

Article Three.

"The assembly shall consist of representatives of the members of the league.

"The assembly shall meet at stated intervals and from time to time at such place as may be determined by the assembly or at such other place as may be decided upon.

"The assembly may deal at its meetings with any matter within the sphere of action of the league or affecting the peace of the world.

"At meetings of the assembly each member of the league shall have one vote and may have not more than three representatives.

(This embodies parts of the original articles one, two and three, with only minor changes. It refers to "members of the league" where the term, "high contracting parties," originally was used, and this change followed throughout the revised draft.)

Article Four.

"The council shall consist of representatives of the United States of America, of the British Empire, of France, of Italy and of Japan, together with representatives of four other members of the league shall be selected by the assembly from time to time in its discretion. Until the appointment of the representatives of the four members of the league first selected by the assembly representatives of—

"With the approval of the majority of the assembly the council may name additional members of the league, whose representatives shall always be members of the council; the council with like approval may increase the number of members of the league to be selected by the assembly for representation on the council.

"The council shall meet from time to time as occasion may require and at least once a year at the seat of the league or at such other place as may be decided upon.

"The council may deal at its meetings with any matter within the sphere of action of the league or affecting the peace of the world.

"Any member of the league not represented on the council shall be invited to send a representative to sit as a member at any meeting of the council during the consideration of matters especially affecting it.

"Such plans shall be subject to reconsideration and revision at least every ten years.

"After these plans shall have been adopted by the several governments, limits of armaments therein fixed shall not be exceeded without the concurrence of the council.

"The members of the league agree that the manufactory of munitions and implements of war is open to great objections. The council shall advise how the evil effects attendant upon such manufacture can be prevented, due regard being had to the necessities of those members of the league which are not able to manufacture the same.

"The council shall make such arrangements as to the scale of their armaments, their military and naval programs and the condition of such of their industries as are adaptable to warlike purposes.

"This covers the ground of the original article eight, but is rewritten to make clearer that armament reduction plans must be adopted by the nations affected before they become effective.)

Article Nine.

"A permanent commission shall be constituted to advise the council on the execution of the provisions of the provisions of Article One and eight and on military and naval questions generally.

(Unchanged except for the insertion of the words "Article One.")

Article Ten.

"The members of the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the league. In case of such aggression or increases of any threat or danger of such aggression the council shall advise upon the means by which this obligation shall be fulfilled.

(Virtually unchanged.)

Article Eleven.

"Any war or threat of war, whether immediately affecting any of the members of the league or not, is hereby declared a matter of concern to the whole league, and the league shall take any action that may be deemed wise and effectual to safeguard the peace of nations. In case any such emergency should arise the secretary-general shall, on the request of any member of the league, forthwith summon a meeting of the council. It is also declared to be the fundamental right of each member of the league to bring to the attention of the assembly or of the council any circumstances whatever affecting international relations which threaten to disturb either the peace or the good understanding between nations upon which peace depends.

(In the original it was provided that the "high contracting parties" reserve the right to take action, etc., where the revised draft reads, "the league shall take any action.")

Article Twelve.

"The members of the league agree that if there should arise between

power of the assembly. It is provided that a report made by the representatives of those members of the league represented on the council and the majority of the other members of the league, exclusive in each case of representatives of the parties to the dispute, shall have the same effect as a report by the council composed by all the members thereof, than the representatives of one or of the parties to the dispute.

(The paragraph specifically excluded from action by the council is in the last sentence the words "concerned in" by the representatives of those members of the league represented on the council, etc., have added.)

Article Sixteen.

"Should any member of the league be at war in disregard of its obligations under articles 12, 13 or 14, it shall ipso facto be deemed to have committed an act of war against the members of the league, a heavy undertaking immediately to meet it to the severance of all financial relations, the prohibition of all intercourse between their nationals and the nationals of the covenant-breaking state, and the prevention of financial, commercial or personal intercourse between the nationals of covenant-breaking state and the nationals of any other state which is a member of the league or not.

"It shall be the duty of the council in such case to recommend to the governments concerned an effective military or naval force members of the league shall sever contributions to the armaments or to the navy of the covenant-breaking state.

"The members of the league further that they will mutually take one another in the financial and economic measures mentioned under this article, in order to minimize the loss and incoherence resulting from the above measures and that they will mutually supply in another way, in order to measure aimed at one of their number by the covenant-breaking state, that they will take the necessary steps to afford passage through their territory to the forces of any of the members of the league which are co-operating to protect the covenant of the league.

(Unchanged, except for the insertion of the last sentence.)

Article Seventeen.

"In the event of a dispute between a member of the league and a state which is not a member of the league, or between states not members of the league, the state or states not members of the league shall be invited to a hearing for the purpose of settling the dispute upon such conditions as may be deemed just if such invitation is accepted, the provisions of article 12 to 16, inclusive, shall apply with such modifications as may be deemed necessary by the council.

"Upon such invitation being accepted the council shall immediately
