RUGBY FOOTBALL AIDS

(1st of a series by B. A. Ralston)

No. 1-The Art of taking the ball ... Better ball handling.

There are two ways of taking the ball: (a) with the hands and arms when the ball is falling from a high kick, and (b) with the hands when it is rolling along the ground or bouncing low, but in neither case should the ball be grabbed. In taking the ball from a high kick the arms should be fairly close together, elbows not too far apart, thus forming receptacle into which the ball falls easily but yet cannot pass through and drop to the ground. In a high kick the hand must be above the level of the eyes and the player must watch the ball fall into his hands. The eyes must not be taken off the ball to watch the opposing players. 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
