Our visitors this month have been Mrs. and Mr. Firingstony, Mr. Lightning and family, wrs. Sampson, Mrs. L. rocque an Mark Steinhauer. One of the activities of the school in which we are greatly interested is the Mission Band to which almost everybody on the premises belongs Bach pays an annual fee of ten cents for membership. Any girl or boy may carn the fee by working for some member of the staff and this they are always delighted to do. The officers are as follows; Superintendent-Mrs. Joblin, President. Peter Burnstick, Vice-President Macchaeus Jackson Recording Secretary-Annie Larocque Corresponding Secretary-Jessic Bull, Treasurer-Jennie House, The band meeting is held once a month on Sunday evening in place of the regular story hour and is conducted most creditably by the officers. Home and foreign missionary work is studied and we think it does us all good to hear of others who are not so favorably situated as ourselves and to do what we can to help them. The Dector hopes he can save his eyesight. Jessie Bull and Haggie Bull make very good bread under the instruction of Miss Story. They sometimes leave some of the plain bread dough in the morning and about one o'clock Abbie Sampson rolls it into small balls about the size of a hen egg and lets it rise three and a half hours. Then they are cooked for thirty or forty minutes and when done are pulled apart. Hot bread or buns is spoiled if cut with a knife. Bread is sufficiently cooked when a slight pressure of the finger on the soft part of the loaf leaves no impression The following recipe is used by the girls." Soak one Royal Yeast Cake in a pint (2 cups) of warm water for half an hour. knx xime Then add enough flour to make a thick batter. Let rise for about three hours. Then mix batter adding a little salt and a quart (4 cups) warm water, with enough flour so that the dough will not stick to the hands. Let rise over night. Put in pans in the morning and let rise again. Then bake. 'If dough is put in too hot an oven a crust quickly forms on top and this presses the air cells and causes a heavy streak. If the oven is not hot enough the air cells run together and form large holes in the centre of the loaf. The oven should be just hot enough to brown a teaspoon flour in five minutes. Do not wrap hot bread in a cloth as it makes it musty.
