POSTMISTRESS ARRESTED.

On a Charge of Embezzling \$2,500 in Ireland.

Windsor, July 21.- Detectives Cambeau and Mahoney of this city and Secret Service Officer Chamberlain of Ottawa made a big capture here they placed rest Mrs. Ellen McKee, formerly subpostmistress at Tubbermore, a suburb of Belfast, Ireland. Mrs. McKee is wanted by the Irish authorities on a

wanted by the Irish authorities on a charge of embezzling about \$2,500 from the postoffice savings deposits and forging receipts to cover her misappropriations.

Sums of money have been disappearing from the Tubbermore Postoffice for the past ten years, and the Irish authorities have been baffled in their every attempt to locate the leakage, so thoroughly and effectually did the postmisters cover up her misdeeds. so thoroughly and effectually did the postmistress cover up her misdeeds. She was traced to Halifax, and thence to this city, where Detective Mahoney located her and has had her under surveillance for some days awaiting instructions from Ireland. She had a drunken husband and eight children to support and did not den the guilt to support, and did not deny her guilt when arrested. She has waived ex-tradition, and will be taken to Ire-land for trial.
