TOWN AND COUNTRY.

GRISTING.—Business is brisk at the new flouring mill. One day this week no less than 200 bushels of grain, all for gristing, was taken in. Evidently Moyer & Brick are giving satisfaction to their customers.

CENTRE HERON.—The Conservatives of this Riding met at Seaford to-day to nominate a candidate to oppose the Hon. Mr. Cartwright, should he run in the constituency, which there is every likelihood of his doing.

A disastrous fire occurred at Parkhill on Sunday morning last, whereby property to the amount of \$30,000 is said to have been destroyed; a large portion of the business part of the town was laid in ashes. The origin of the fire is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.

THE AUSTRALIANS.—The match at Toronto this week resulted disastrously for the Canadians, the scores standing: Canadians, 1st innings, 100; 2nd innings, 64. Australians, 1st innings, 123; 2nd innings, a sufficient number of runs were obtained with one man out, the Australians thus winning the game by 10 wickets.

THANKSGIVING.—In conformity with a resolution adopted by the Synod at its last session, setting apart the 28th of September in October for the annual Diocesan day of Thanksgiving, special Thanksgiving services will be held in Christ's church, Listowel, on Sunday next. The offertory will be devoted to assist in the support of the missionary Diocese of Algoma.

STILL MORE VICTORIES.—Both Gaspe and Nicolet have returned Conservatives by large majorities. In Jacques Cartier, Hon. R. Laflamme threw up the sponge before the re-count was finished, but not until the Conservative candidate, Mr. Girouard, was counted in by a majority of two. Dawson, ministerialist, has been elected in Algoma. Polling takes place in British Columbia on the 21st, when five out of the six seats are expected to return Conservative members.

A GALE.—During the violent wind storm which prevailed in this neighborhood on Wednesday morning, a portion of the brick wall, some 50 feet in length and of considerable depth, belonging to Mr. D. D. Campbell's handsome block new in course of erection on Main street, was blown down. It fell with a tremendous crash, making a serious wreck of some of the interior parts of the building. Trees and fences in the town and country were levelled to the ground. We learn that the smoke-stack on the Hammond cheese factory succumbed to the blast, and that considerable damage was done in that vicinity.

AT LONDON.—Among the successful exhibitors at the Western Fair last week, we notice the names of Messrs. Turner & Campbell, who were rewarded the first prize for Spanish sole leather. This is his honorable evidence that the position which the Listowel tannery holds in the leather market is well deserved. An extensive dealer in leather, and a gentleman entirely disinterested in Listowel or its manufactures, recently volunteered his well founded opinion that the Listowel tannery was the best sole leather tannery in Western Canada. To hear our industries thus spoken of abroad is a credit to the town, and may long continue to enjoy its justly celebrated name, should be the wish of all good townsmen.

CATTLE FAIR.—The October cattle fair was undoubtedly the largest and best that has yet taken place in Listowel. From the extensive sales made we would infer that there must have been in the neighborhood of five hundred head brought forward. Buyers were numerous, and the rapidity with which transactions took place, indicated that they were disposed to offer good figures. A greater part of the market was made up of young cattle, and in nearly every instance the figures realized were fully up to the mark if not beyond their actual worth. Among the dealers were Messrs. Guelph, Alex and Peter Robb, of Maryborough, Grafton Smith of Zorra, and others whose names we did not learn. They each took away large droves, some as many as one hundred head. Young cattle averaged about \$20 per head; dairy cows, \$25 to \$35; and two yoke of oxen sold for \$194. Peter Robb being the purchaser of the latter. Altogether the sales were satisfactory, and but few animals remained at the close of the market. The activity displayed was a pleasant contrast to many of the previous cattle fairs held here, and although its success was partially due to the attraction of the Fall Show, then being held, it augurs well for the future development of the Listowel cattle market.

TOWN COUNCIL.—The Town Council met on Monday evening, 7th inst. Present, J. W. Scott, mayor; D. D. Hay, Deputy Mayor; and Councillors Freeman, Hepler, Deavitt, Nichol, Austin, Dilworth and Kinning. After minutes of previous meeting had been approved, it was moved by A. Austin, seconded by Dr. Dilworth, that a committee be appointed to look at the Bellinger property on Mill street, and report as to advisability of purchasing the whole of the property, the committee to afford information, and correspond with or interview any party or parties, either proposing to establish manufactures in the town or seeking information in respect thereto, the mayor to be convener of the committee.—Carried. A special committee is named, to consist of J. W. Scott, T. E. Hay, John Bannay, Jacob Hepler, D. D. Hay and Geo. Townner, with power to add to their numbers either from within or without the Council, to collect and afford information, and correspond with or interview any party or parties, either proposing to establish manufactures in the town or seeking information in respect thereto, the mayor to be convener of the committee.—Carried. Councillors Turner and Hacking took their seat at the Board. The following accounts were passed on the recommendation of the Finance Committee: J. A. Hacking, \$5.27, for coal oil for engine room; John Hampton, \$1.50, for services as special constable; John Osborne, \$25, for quarter's rent for engine room; ac-

count of John Barber, \$11, for attendance on Mrs. Wilcox, also for mattress, laid over. Dr. Nichol moved, seconded by J. Hepler, that the chairman of the board of works be directed to have the dam on the creek at the south end of Dr. Nichol's property removed immediately.—Carried. It was moved by A. D. Freeman, seconded by J. Hepler, that the chairman of the board of works take proper steps to remove all drift-wood from the bed of the river immediately.—Carried. Geo. Townner moved, seconded by A. S. Deavitt, that a license for a bowling alley with two alleys, be granted to James Swan, license fee to be \$25 per annum.—Carried. Council adjourned.

SONGS OF SCOTLAND.—The talented Scotch vocalist, Hamilton Corbett, is announced to give one of his rich entertainments in the Grand Central Hall on Tuesday evening next, 15th inst. Both the old country and Canadian press speak enthusiastically of this gentleman's rare talent, and the lovers of Scotch songs may look for a treat such as they are but seldom if ever afforded in Listowel. The Woodstock Review makes the following allusion to his recent visit to that town: "Those who failed to attend Mr. Hamilton Corbett's concert of the Scottish Song in the town hall on Thursday and Friday evenings, missed one of the best musical treats ever afforded the people of Woodstock. In praise of the entertainment too much cannot be said. Mr. Corbett is a perfect master of Scotch song, and we only repeat the unanimous verdict of all who listened to his performance, when we say that as a singer he is superior to Kennedy. He also relates Scotch anecdotes with great effect. His rendering of 'The Land of the Leal,' and 'Scots Wha Hae,' fully demonstrated the wonderful compass of the singer's voice. The first was sung with a pathos and feeling we have never heard equalled, while the inimitable Scottish war song was produced in all its force and vigor. Mr. Corbett intimated his intention of again visiting Woodstock in the course of a few weeks, and when he comes we bespeak for him a bumper house."
