CURREY DIVORCE SUIT NOW  
BEING HEARD AT CAPITAL

Many Allegations of Cruelty Made in Hus-  
band's Libel—Mrs. Currey Denies Them  
—Case Adjourned Until Today

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 27.—At the divorce court yesterday the case of Lemuel Allen Currey v. Mary Eliza Currey, had the court suit of Mary Eliza Currey v. Lemuel Allen Currey, were taken up before His Honor Judge Gregory. In opening the case His Honor Judge Gregory asked if the people could not get together and make reasonable efforts to be reconciled. He said that he dreaded the matter being aired in the courts.

C. N. Skinner, who appeared for Mr. Currey, said that so far as his client was concerned that he had made reasonable efforts to have the matter fixed up and it was no use to make any further efforts. That Mrs. Currey had gone about St. John, telling all kinds of stories about Mr. Currey and this was a chance for him to get his side before the public. It was agreed that the two cases be consolidated. Mr. Skinner read the libel of Lemuel A. Currey, charging his wife with cruelty. He complained that his wife had treated him in a cruel and violent manner; that on one occasion she kicked him on the right knee and called him a d—miserable wretch. She swore at him when he protested the children, and attacked him at his summer home in Woodman's Point and threw a glass of water in his face and the glass at his head, and on another occasion she hit him in the face with a dirty blanket. She called him a brute and said that she would kick his d—stomach off. He also charged that his wife had invited bad boys to the house, who taught the children bad habits, and that she had taken away girls to the summer home and had given them the best room in the house, making him take an inferior room. He also said that his wife was an infidel and scoffed at religion. Also that she had taken one of the children, who was ill, to Woodman's Point from the city against the doctor's and his orders. The libel set forth that the couple had been married in Michigan on Dec. 27, 1894, by an Episcopal minister, and had four children. His wife had caused him ridicule and scandal before the public at St. John, and as a consequence of her violent temper and cruel treatment he was obliged to take his meals away from home.

Mrs. Currey, in reply to the libel, denied the allegations emphatically and charged her husband was cruel, of intemperate habits and frequently swore at and ill-treated her before the children and threatened to turn her from the house. In turn Mr. Currey replied denying the charges set forth by his wife.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 28.—The Currey divorce suits were again before the Divorce Court this morning. Mr. Tedd upheld upon the urgent need of money. The divorce suit was already granted had been used up and Mrs. Currey had no means. Mr. Skinner said the children should not be responsible for his debts.

It was not true, she added, that she had made the cruel remark attributed to her by Lord Rosslyn when the wine arrived at Thurso. She had actually said: "I don't think it nice to have boxes of wine all sent in my name."

When he was called, the Earl merely affirmed in the Scotch style, Countess Georgiana, for her part, swore dramatically "to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth."

RUSSIAN DUMA WILL HAVE  
A PROFITABLE SESSIONCOLLEGE MAN ARRESTED  
FOR FLEEING HIS FRIENDS

Cornell Graduate Locked Up for Passing Worthless Cheques to the Amount of \$5,000.

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—F. B. Humphrey, a graduate of Cornell University class of '04, was arrested yesterday in Chicago on a charge of passing worthless checks. Humphrey is 30 years old and a son of the late L. A. Humphrey, a wealthy shoe merchant of Elmira, N. Y. While at college he was editor-in-chief of the Cornellian, and the class book, and was a member of the Delta Upsilon Fraternity. The police say he has swindled old college chums in Chicago and other western cities out of more than \$5,000 since August.

All of the checks so far as has been discovered have been signed by Humphrey and drawn on the Dayton Ohio Savings and Trust Bank. Humphrey had tried to swindle his former classmates. He said his mother died in July and left him considerable money which he believed had been deposited at the Ohio Bank.

Better Feeling Prevails  
Between the Parties and  
Since the Members are  
Now Experienced, Im-  
portant Business Will be  
Hurried Through

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 28.—The Russian parliament which reopened today for the autumn session, promises to be the most fruitful since the establishment of the Duma. A number of important reforms, which were in the committee stage in the preceding session, are now ready for immediate consideration in the lower house, and others are far advanced, and since the dangers threatening their predecessors have been fully dissipated the legislators can attend to their task with the certainty of hurrying it to successful completion.

The Duma will be occupied for a long period of time with the discussion of the budget, which probably will not be ratified before March first. The debate on the estimates in the earlier session occupied almost the entire time of the House to the exclusion of actual legislation, but the members are now familiar with the work and the discussion of important reforms can be conducted simultaneously.

Precedence will be given to two measures connected with the Agrarian problem, namely the one permitting the dissolution of communes and the transfer of lands to individual ownership and reform of the local courts among the peasantry. The Duma leaders were in favor of the law governing religious freedom and relating to local self-government are also on the calendar for this session.

The relations between the various parties have been greatly improved of late and the conscientious manner in which the special democrats and the republicans have worked together has given great encouragement to the leaders of the parliament.

## BRITISH VESSEL SEIZED.

Captain and Men Flung Into Venezuelan Prison.

ST. VINCENT, B. W. I., Oct. 27.—Word has been received here of the seizure several weeks ago by the Venezuelan authorities of a British trading vessel at Margarita, an island in the Caribbean Sea, belonging to Venezuela, and the imprisonment of the crew. The St. Vincent schooner Lady Kensington, carrying live stock and vegetables for Trinidad, after sighting the Dragon's Mouth was beached near the shore and the crew was detained as prisoners ever since.

The owner of the vessel has just received through the Trinidad agent, a letter from the captain of the Lady Kensington, dated September 26, in which he says: "We are still imprisoned. Our provisions have been exhausted and the government says that it has no food to give us."

The governor of Trinidad has communicated with Sir Vincent Corbett, the British Minister at Caracas, inquiring as to the cause of the vessel's detention.

## WESTMORLAND MAN

KILLED IN THE WEST  
Abel Legere Met Death in  
Railway Accident

L. C. R. Insurance Report for the Month  
—Mr. Emerson Might Have Had a  
Larger Majority in Moncton

MONCTON, Oct. 28.—Secretary Paver, of the L. C. R. Employees Relief and Insurance Association has submitted his report for the month ended October 25th, in which there were four deaths in the ranks of the association. These were William Kelly, of St. John, retired member, who has \$1,000 insurance, F. B. Thiridge, Halifax, sleeping car conductor, who had \$250, and Richard Keith, of Campbellton, who had \$500. The fourth death was F. W. Burke of Halifax, member of the temporary employees accident fund, who died from effects of injuries received while on duty.

Abel Legere, of Legere's Corner, on Monday evening received a telegram announcing that his brother, Abel Legere, had been killed at Somerset, Manitoba. No particulars were given in the telegram except that deceased had been killed in an accident on a railway. Deceased young man was thirty years of age, and a son of the late surveyor Legere, and went west about eight years ago. He is survived by his wife and a little girl. A sad feature of the affair is that the deceased's mother and sister, Miss Barbara, had gone west a short time ago to visit him. Deceased was grain buyer for a large western concern.

The Liberal majority in Moncton city and parish, which was nearly one thousand, might have been at least one hundred and fifty larger. There were about that number of names in Moncton city and parishes of people who were qualified in other counties, but it was felt that Mr. Emerson's list was too long and the voters were permitted to elect to vote in other constituencies.

Word was received here last night of the death of Mrs. John B. Kennedy, which occurred at St. John, N. B., on Tuesday, October 27th. She belonged to Moncton but has been living in Malden for several years.

## A TEACHER'S HEROISM.

Girl in Michigan Saved Children From Forest Fires.

BAY CITY, Mich., Oct. 27.—Among the most thrilling experiences of survivors of the Presque Isle county forest fire was that of Miss Grace Barber, a school teacher, nineteen years old, whose school in Krakaw township was in session when the flames swept down upon the building. A terrified teacher fled to the school house and saw the school house caught fire.

The young teacher, marshalled her pupils in a double row, the largest at the head, and ordered them to remain in close order and not to break the line. She then directed the leaders to head for a ploughed field nearby, and the column started on a run. Miss Barber bringing up the rear to prevent straggling. Burning embers fell thick, but the teacher kept the children crowded close together, and every ember was extinguished the instant it fell upon any child's clothing.

The fire burned steadily for some time as the blaze in the tops of the trees ate its way down. During the night two bears made their appearance, one of which was slinking in, as did also a wild cat, rabbits, porcupine, and other game, but the animals kept away from the children.

Miss Barber kept her charge in the field all Thursday night, and in the morning sent them home in a wagon, plotting the smaller ones herself.

## A BLOW TO HALIFAX.

To every patriotic citizen of Halifax City and County the result of the election in this constituency must be a bitter disappointment and none will rejoice at the Opposition victory except those extreme Tory partisans who are always willing to sacrifice the best interests of their City and Province, not to mention every principle of honesty and patriotism, for the sake of a little party gain or glorification. 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WOUNDED BUCK DEER  
CHARGED A HUNTER

With Leg Broken and Horn Shot Off,  
Dying Animal Made Desperate

Attack on London Man.

EDMONTON, Oct. 27.—With a bullet through the top of his head, a horn shot off and one leg broken with other bullets from a 30-30 rifle, a big buck deer actually charged a hunter after being shot by a man named Mr. Waters, who managed to partly evade the crazed animal and then got a point-blank shot into its brain, which finished it.

That is the record hunting story which Edgar Waters, of New London, Ont., resident, who has been in the city for a few weeks, brings back from Gambier Island, where he has been spending a fortnight hunting and fishing. He is stopping at a downtown hotel, and has the animal's head mounted on one horn, also a gash a couple of inches long in his arm which the wounded animal inflicted with its remaining horn when it turned on him.

Mr. Waters came upon the deer suddenly in a little gully with a narrow entrance, which afforded the only exit. The deer tried first to climb through the brush on the cliff and escape and the first bullet broke its left hind leg. It fell, but regained its feet, and got the next bullet, as investigation afterwards revealed, through the top of its head. That did not stop it, and as it was turning for a rush through the narrow exit of the gully Mr. Waters aimed at the head and the bullet broke a horn close to the skull. Still the buck kept on and charged right into Mr. Waters, who managed to partly evade the crazed animal and then got a point-blank shot into its brain, which finished it.
