After leaving Canada the regiment was stationed in Great Britain for some time, leaving in 1845 for South Africa. On the way the transports stopped at Montevideo and for six months defended the city against a beseiging Argentine force. Then they continued their journey. A tribute was paid to the regiment by the Duke of Wellington for the coolness shown by the officers and the men at a time of great danger when a terrible storm was encountered at the mouth of Great Fish River.
