Capt. Cornelius Repeats His Address

Large Crowd at Brant Theatre Was Delighted With His Address

There was a large attendance in the Brant Theatre last evening when Capt. Cornelius gave his most interesting address, relating his experiences at the front and dwelling on the efficiency of Red Cross work.

Lt.-Col. Howard made a most efficient speech in his opening speech he expressed regret that some criticism had been offered with regard to such a gathering on Sunday night. The event was under the auspices of the Women's Patriotic League, composed of Christian women who had worked nobly for the cause and most of whom had dear ones at the front. He felt that the moral life of the community was quite safe in their hands and that they would be the last to violate the sanctity of Sabbath. The proceeds would go to the Red Cross.

Miss Hurley sang, in excellent voice, "It's a long, long Trail." Capt. Cornelius, in his rose to speak, received a great reception. He repeated in substance the address recently delivered in St. James School House and fully reported in the Courier. In addition he went on Red Cross work. He stated that when a man was wounded he was picked up by Red Cross stretcher bearers and treated with every tenderness. Their initial act was to apply first aid field dressing and they were then carried to the first line hospital where doctors and nurses were in readiness. Referring to the devotion of the Red Cross nurses the speaker related one of many incidents as follows: He thanked God for the Red Cross and so did all the others at the front and they carried on their work on Sundays too, just the same as any other day. He was glad to say, was on his way to recovery.

The Captain spoke for over an hour and held the deep interest of his hearers throughout. The vote of thanks was carried. In extending the same to Capt. Cornelius, Col. Howard paid a high and noble tribute to the front and said that in letters which he, the speaker, had received from the commanding officer the Captain had been spoken of in the warmest terms of praise for his bravery and efficiency.

The proceeds amounted to nearly \$40.

Kaiser Has Another Guess Coming Yet

(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent of the Canadian Press in France)

Canadian Army Headquarters, May 28.—Rumor has it that the Kaiser recently visited Donald, addressing a gathering of officers and troops holding the Scarpe-Lens line announced that the British offensive in the region of the Scarpe was at an end.

The Kaiser is a good talker, but had his officers taken him out to the Arvon, Mercourt and Acherville and other points east of Vimy, where the German defences are crumbling under the steady fire of the Canadian guns, he might not have been so dogmatic.

Our aviators report that the industrious Germans are far from confident of their ability to hold the Mercurville supply line. New systems are being laid out behind it on which it is believed British prisoners are being employed.

Three Canadian prisoners, the first in a considerable time, were obtained in an extensive raid opposite Acherville early this morning. The Germans raided after a heavy barrage. About two o'clock some two hundred came over and attacked a wiring party. Our casualties were very light, while the enemy left a number of dead in front of our lines and some prisoners of the fifth Prussian foot guards.

In the artillery operations which are now in progress, some old fortifications have developed. The enemy has developed a fondness for the use of gas shells, probably because chemicals are more plentiful than metal
