One tooth, the upper left canine, has a tooth, the upper teeth are more or less broken. There was nothing in the pockets except a small circular pocket mirror.

Prof. Cozens is a gentleman above the ordinary stature, of pleasing address, kindly face and intensely earnest manner. He has travelled quite extensively and is a decidedly enthusiastic devotee to his profession.

"Phrenology is a reading of 'bumps on the head,' as is popularly believed," he said in a brief interview with The Planet. "It is rather a measurement of brain development and a consequent delineation of character and natural aptitude or tendency. Its study opens up many fascinating researches in human nature and character. Its value to lawyers, public men and others can readily be estimated."
