An Expert Marksman.

The terms "sharpshooter," "expert marksman," etc., which have distinguished the classes of military riflemen are often puzzling to those not familiar with rifle practice. To become a marksman ene must make 38 out of a possible 150 at 200, 800 and 500 yards. The sharpshooter must get 100 out of 200 at 200, 800, 500 and 600 yards, besides doing well enough in eliminsh to bring his total to 225, or tye-chirds of the possible score. An expert must de all this and nise score 40 out of 50 at 200 yards and 25 out of 50 at 1,000 yards. The latter distance is more than half a mile and the bullseye looks mighty small.
