

Preaching at the Manchester Cathedral, the Bishop of Manchester (Dr. Knex) took as his subject the Book of Exodus, speaking first of its main purport, secondly of its relation to the other Books of the Bible, and thirdly about its historical importance. He did not feel it any exaggeration to say that without the Book of Exodus the New Testament was dim and almost unintelligible, for the true central figure of the latter was the Lamb of God sacrificed on Calvary to establish communion between God and mankind. That grast sacrifice was connected as closely as possible with the Feast of the Passover, instituted in Exodus. The book was the key to the rest of the Bible, excepting only the Book of Genesis. The one great truth of all religion, if there was any truth in religion at all, was communion with God. Where could they find one basis of fact on which to rest that glorious truth? They found it in the Book of Exodus. Those who regarded the Incarnation of the Lord and the Resurrection as absolute facts, and therefore miraculous facts, could hardly wonder that they were heralded by the miraculous facts of the Book of Exodus. The facts recorded there had shaped not only the history of Israel, but the history of the world.

Town Sold At Auction.

Town Soid At Auction.

The village of Wilkinson, in the eastern part of Sutton, Mass., was sold at public auction recently. The place was once one of the most important manufacturing villages on the Blackstone River, but of late years the business has gradually dwindled. Besides the mills, which, when in operation, had 341 looms and produced a weekly average of 2,000 pieces of print cloth, the estate consisted of mineteen houses and forty-two tenements, a store, hall and boardinghouse. The cotton mill has been idle since 1897. The principal part of the property, consisting of the main mill, smaller mills, four houses, twenty-four acres of land and the water rights, was sold for \$4,925 to a dealer in second hand machinery.

The quotation, "Cleanliness is next to godliness," does not appear in the Bible at all.

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
